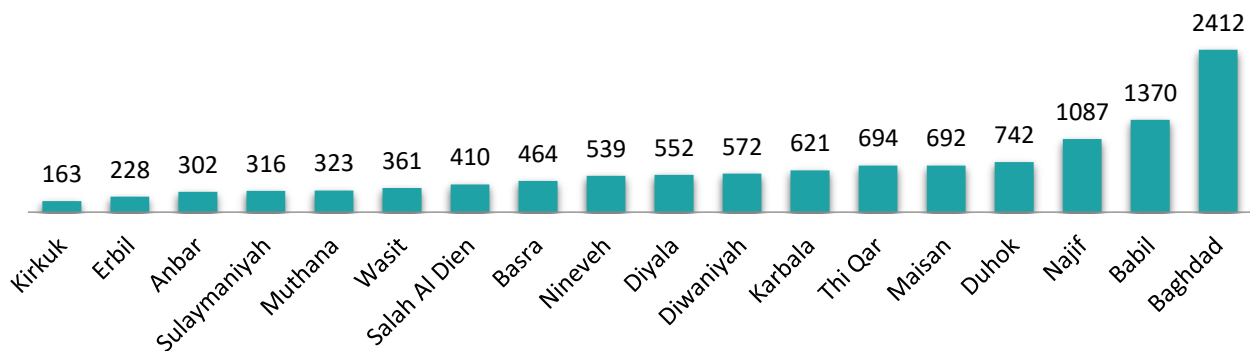
Annual Report for Iraqi Red Crescent Society (IRCS)

**Briefing:**

Iraq faced several challenges to reconstruct the damage that occurred in various parts of Iraq, this has resulted in supporting the affected and displaced families as well as their assistance in restoring community stability through the rehabilitation of infrastructure, provision of livelihood facilities and increased community resilience.

The Iraqi Red Crescent Society has distinguished itself from other humanitarian institutions by assisting the affected families and by responding to the needs of the affected families of displaced persons and a host community and in coordination and cooperation with partners inside and outside the international movement. While keeping Continuous coordination with local governments.

Our National Society has 18 branches spread across all provinces of Iraq, 83 offices and 14 representatives, in addition to 2,889 human resources and 11,539 volunteers. The Iraqi Red Crescent Society has attracted 489 volunteers in 2019 and table 1 below shows the number of volunteers in all provinces of Iraq.

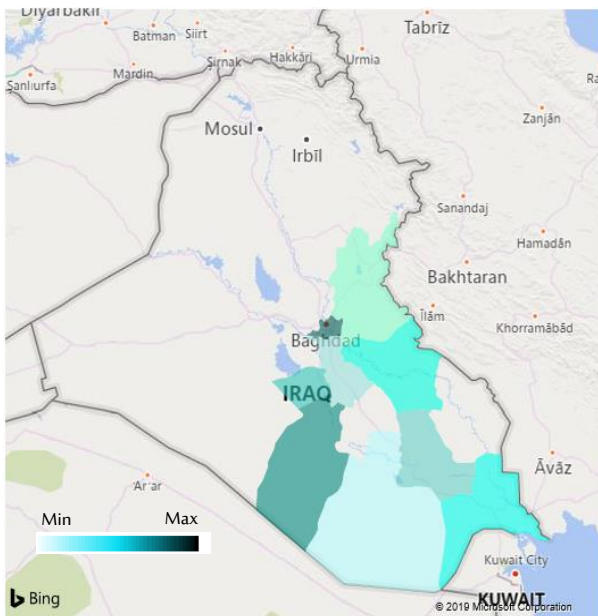

**Current Situation**



Iraq is witnessing demonstrations in the central and southern provinces, sometimes peaceful and sometimes unstable, which made the Iraqi Red Crescent respond by providing treatment services, first aid, ambulance transport and physical therapy services for demonstrators without discrimination or siding with one side over the other. These services are provided by the cadres of the branches of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society in eight provinces (Baghdad, Karbala, Najaf, Thi Qar, Muthanna, Wasit, Diyala, Babil and Basra) as described below. So far, there have been unstable protests and many demonstrators who require more services, either ambulance services or hospital transfers, the figures of the covered assistance are 8,762 of beneficiaries, 1,323 Volunteers and 620 First Aid Kits used. And 37,118 beneficiaries from first aid services.

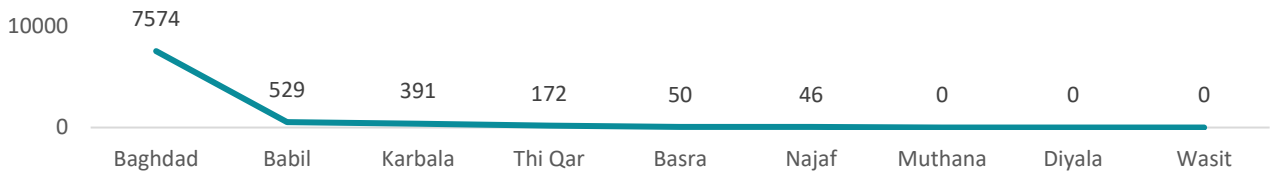


Fig (2) People transfer to hospital

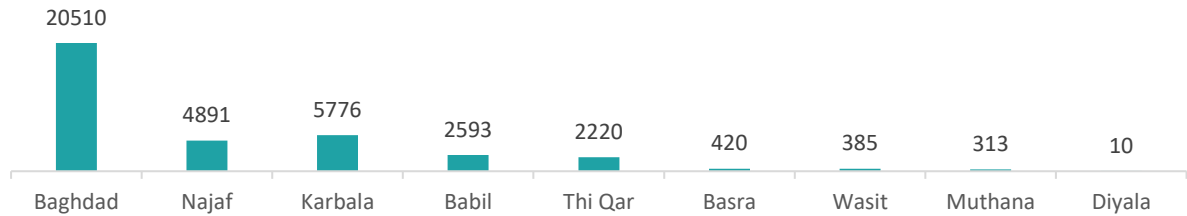


Fig (3) Beneficiaries from first aid services

On the other hand, Iraq is hosting of a large number of Syrian refugees who have fled from their homes as a result of the security crisis in Syria, the role of Iraqi Red Crescent teams in receiving and transporting refugees from the border to camps in northern Iraq with the Syrian border camp (Barda Rash) and (Jolan) The Iraqi Red Crescent Society worked in coordination with other local and international organizations and local authorities to provide humanitarian needs for Syrian refugees, transported receive them, and the total number of new refugees (21,357) families, as described below

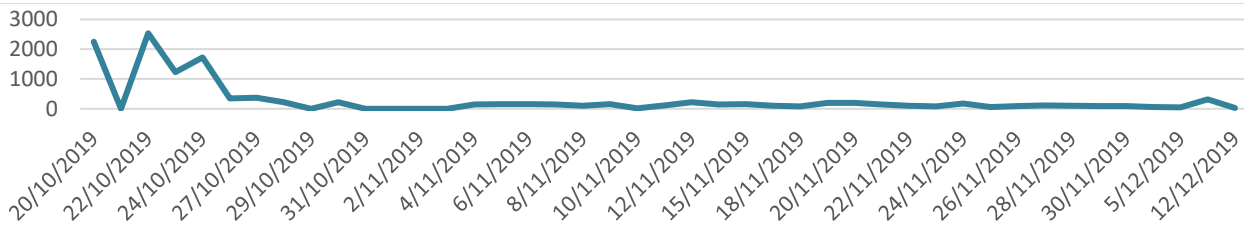
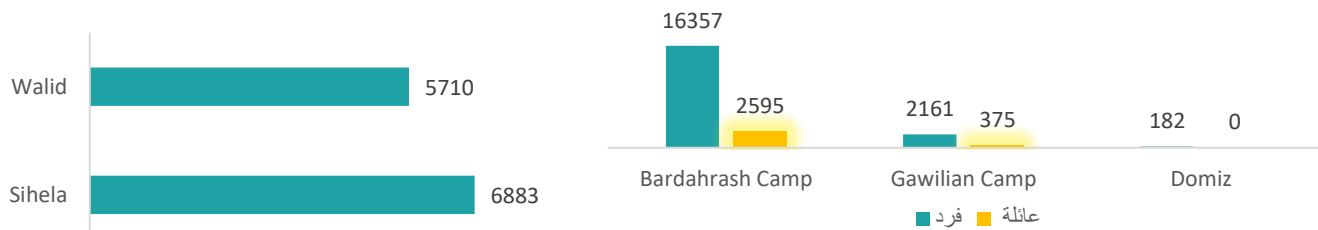


Fig (4) Refugee at border every day from 20/10-12/12/2019

### People in Needs /Brief:

The humanitarian needs in Iraq continue to be unstable according to security situation and the escalation of crises from disasters, and this increases of lack of protection, lack of resources and the absence of long-term and sustainable livelihood programs to support, recover and rehabilitate the most vulnerable groups and this makes The situation is dire and Iraq is classified as a high-risk area, according to the Report of the Center for Monitoring and Coordination of The Joint Coordination. According to statistics from the Ministry of Planning, the total number of the most vulnerable groups is 6.13 million, the number of people affected is 5.62 million, and the number of people most needed is 4.10 million, including 1.77 million displaced people still in the camps.

### Our Programs

#### 1- Disaster Management Program

IRCS responded through the staff of the disaster management program immediately to humanitarian operations in accordance with the principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, through the implementation of livelihood programs, cash transfers and mini-projects in addition to awareness and disaster risk reduction, as well as providing Ready-made and hot food assistance and relief assistance that are continuing to date.

The total number of beneficiaries of disaster management program activities (794,018) individuals are classified as follows:

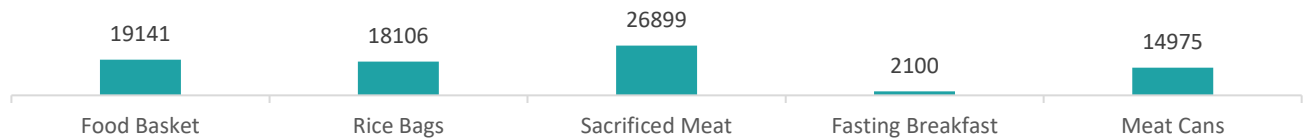
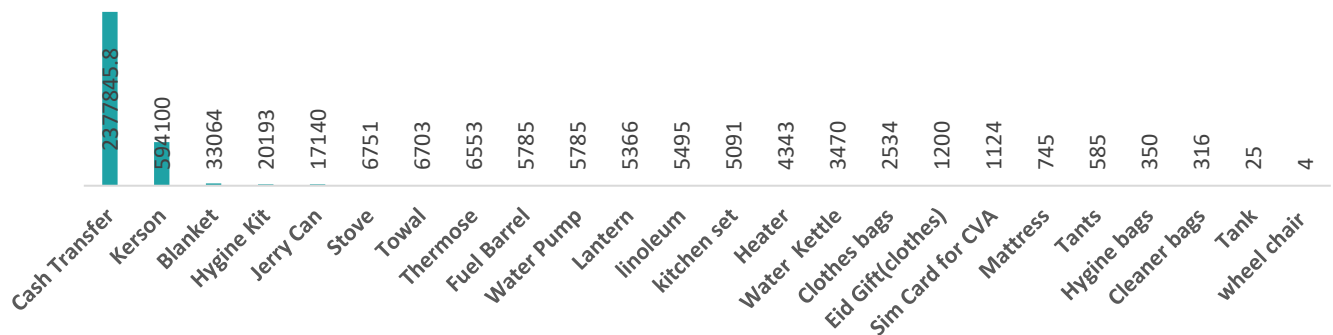


Fig (7) The Quantities of Food Items distributed

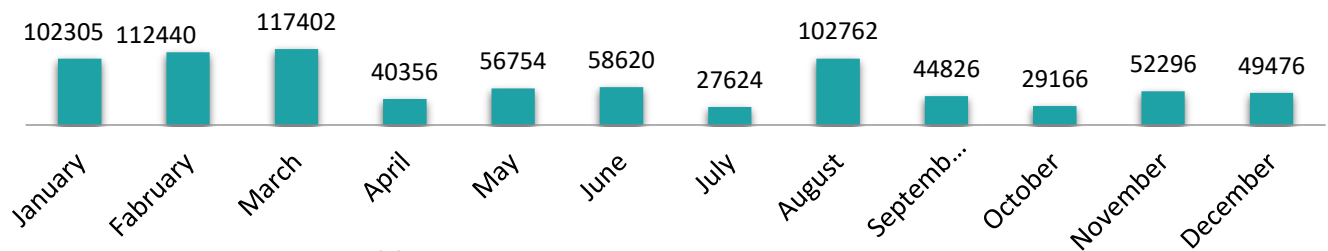
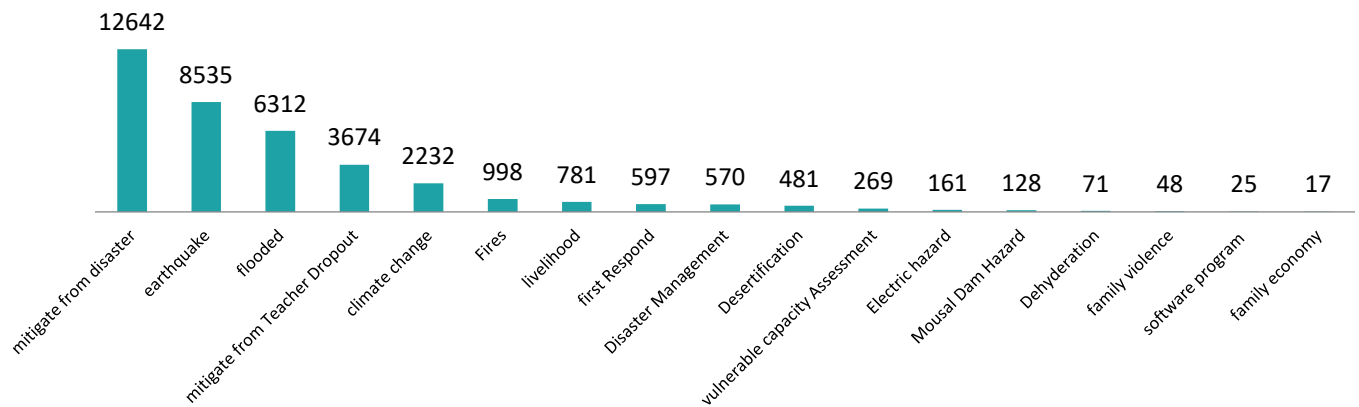


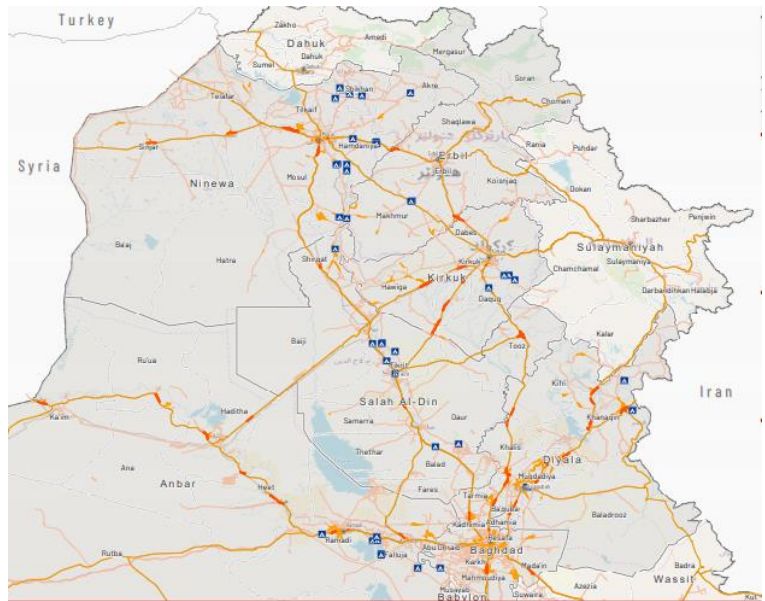
Fig. (9) Beneficiaries from food and non food items each month

-Food and relief assistance: IRCS provides food and relief assistance according to the need, where the number of beneficiaries (752,479) individuals and as described in the Fig. (7) and (8), while the number of beneficiaries according to each month explained in Fig. (9).

-Disaster Risk Reduction Awareness: This program provides awareness lectures to support and enhance the community's resilience and disaster preparedness as the first responder to the disaster until support arrives, including (earthquake awareness - flood awareness and floods - electricity hazards - risk management Disasters - Family Economy - First Responder and First Aid - Reducing School Dropouts - Mental Health - Community Outreach Groups - Spreading a Culture of Peace and International Humanitarian Law. The number of beneficiaries was 37,541. As shown in Fig (10).

-Cash transfers: In cooperation with our partners in the international movement of the German Red Cross, the Danish Red Cross and the International Committee of the Red Cross, the project has been planned and implemented by our association and special teams have been trained to advance this program and prepare implementation plans, evaluation, monitoring and preparation Guide to the basic procedures to work on them and the use of mechanisms and tools to distribute money to the affected families in cooperation with the companies of local service providers where the project recorded great success in accordance with international standards and reached the amount of amounts distributed as described below

Fig(8) The Quantities of non- Food Items distributed

**IDPS Movement 2019:**

As a result of security stability in the first part of 2019 and rehabilitation of many facilities in the home towns of the affected displacement, 4,500,000 million displaced persons returned during the period (6/2017-2019) from affected families from the provinces (Nineveh, Salahaldin, Kirkuk and Diyala), and there are still (1,500,000) displaced persons according to the latest statistics distributed in the camps in the provinces as follows: (13 camps in Nineveh), (6 camps in Anbar),( 8 camps in Salah al-Din), (4 camps in Kirkuk), (2 camps in Diyala) and as shown in map camp sites and the association continues to provide support in the relief, food and other aspects to this day. The number of families who left the camps in Nineveh was 14,700 families and salah al-Din camps 1,519 families and Anbar 636 families





Effectuated by Floods:

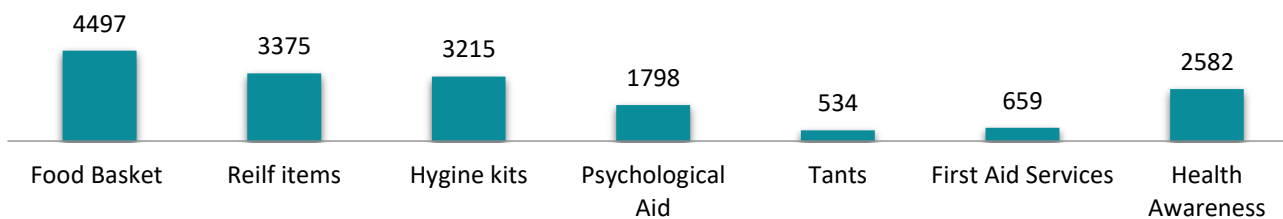
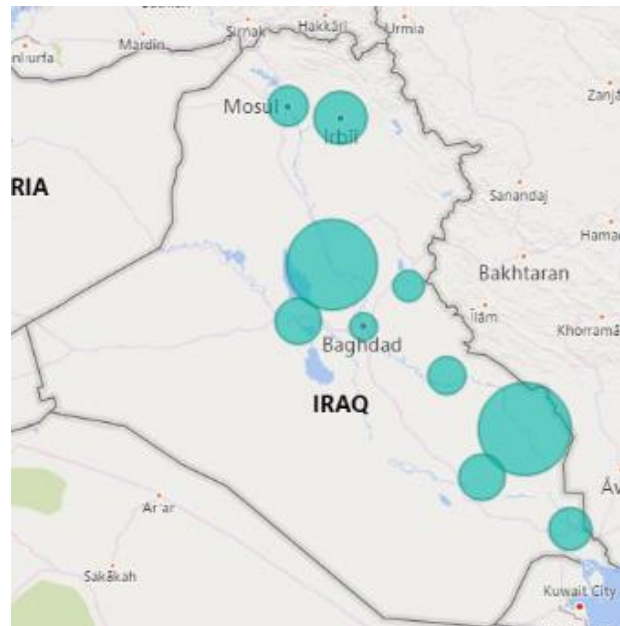


Fig (11) the number of beneficiaries from each sector

During the first six months of 2019, Iraq witnessed a series of floods in different areas of eleven provinces (Maysan, Basra, Dhi Qar, Wasit, Diyala, Salah al-Din, Kirkuk, Anbar, Nineveh, Baghdad, Erbil) (6,256) affected families and as shown in map 3. The Iraqi Red Crescent Society has provided relief services to 5,582 families affected by the floods, including the provision of shelter, medical care and first aid services, in addition to securing basic food and relief needs, and the number of beneficiaries of relief and food services is (4742) Family, health services is (840) family and as described in Figure (11) below: This response coincided with the Response of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society to assist displaced and returning families across Iraq.

International coordination of global disasters:

The Iraqi Red Crescent Society has responded to the relief appeal for Bosnia and Herzegovina, which was posted on the Website of the International Federation as a result of the displacement of many people and amounted to 2,000 U.S. dollars.



Syria Crisis:

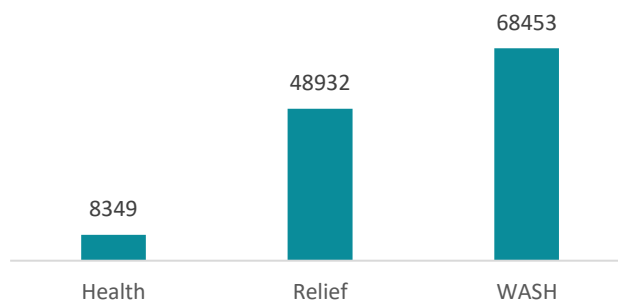


Fig.(13) Beneficiaries of Syria Refugee by Program

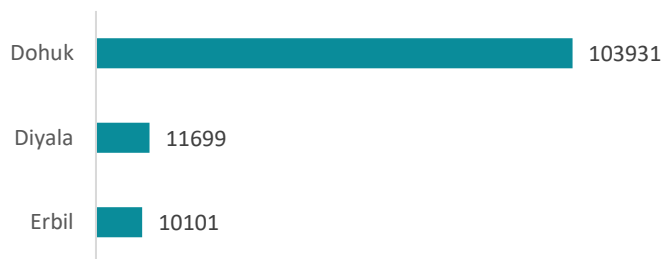


Fig. (14) Refugee Beneficiaries by Governorate

In addition to the 21,357 new refugees in 2019, the Iraqi Red Crescent Society continues to provide services to Syrian refugees in Iraq, and in 2018 the number was 246,005, in addition to the 21,357 new refugees in 2019. The current total is 267,362. Health services, psychological support and safe drinking water, as well as awareness programs to promote hygiene and distribution of relief materials were provided in cooperation and coordination with our partners in the international movement, where the total number of beneficiaries (125,731) of Syrian refugees in the camps established in Provinces in northern Iraq shown in figure (14) while Figure (13) shows the total number of refugee beneficiaries from each program. As for those who support the needs of Syrian refugees, as described below:

## 2 -Health and Medical Program:

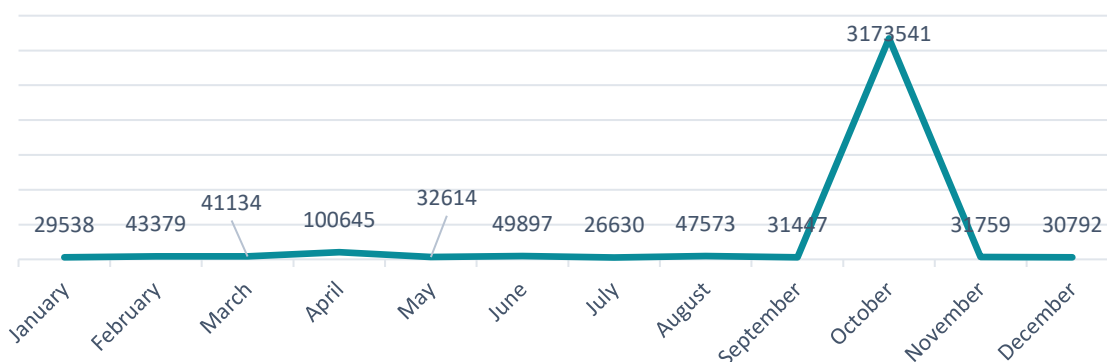


Fig. (15) Beneficiaries from Health Services by each month

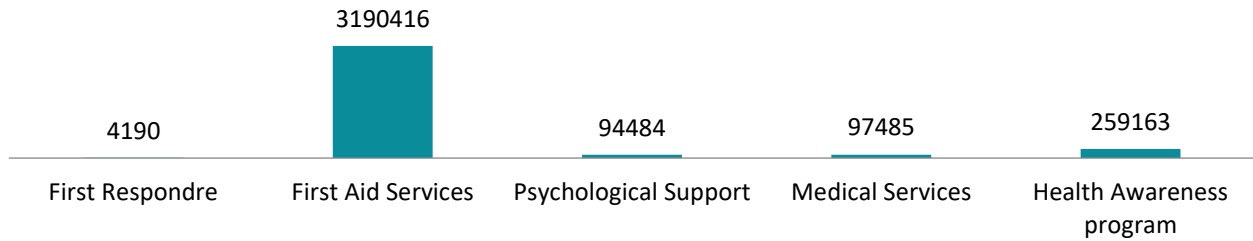


Fig. (16) Beneficiaries from Health Services by Programs

The IRCS provided health and medical services through health centers, mobile medical clinics and inside and outside the camps for displaced, affected and returning families and the total beneficiaries of health and medical programs (3,645,738) individual, the number of females (1,284,014) and male (2361724) male, and displaced beneficiaries constitute (88,379) displaced individuals as shown in figure (15) and figure (16). Health and medical programs include the following services:

1. The Iraqi Red Crescent Society is working with the Iraqi Ministry of Health and the World Health Organization (WHO) to support vaccination programs for children against measles and polio, and the number of beneficiaries has reached 14,223 children aged 9 months to 5 years.
2. Health awareness programs: awareness sessions to raise awareness and health culture for the community to reduce the risk of disease and spread the concepts of personal and environmental hygiene. The number of beneficiaries (234,700) as described in figure (16)
3. Medical services: the number of beneficiaries (89,492) is provided in the form of the role of the Ministry of Health, especially emergency time through mobile medical clinics, fixed or mobile health centers.
4. Psychological support: to provide assistance to the most vulnerable groups to reduce the severity of psychological crises and suffering and bring them back to life to maintain the stability of life.
5. First Aid: Is to provide assistance to treat some injuries when they occur before the arrival of medical assistance by trained staff on first aid. The number of beneficiaries (3,188,068)
6. First Responder: advanced life-saving ambulance service (such as cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and follow-up vital activities of the injured person and evacuation by ambulance by a trained team specialized in providing this service from the site of the event to the nearest medical center and the number of beneficiaries (3,744) individuals and through 41 cars Ambulance distributed in all provinces of Iraq as shown in Fig. (16)

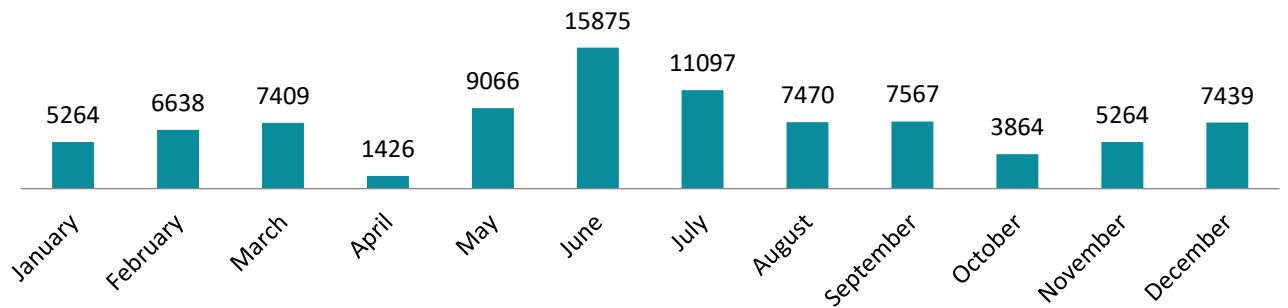


Fig. (17) Medical Services for IDPS According to months

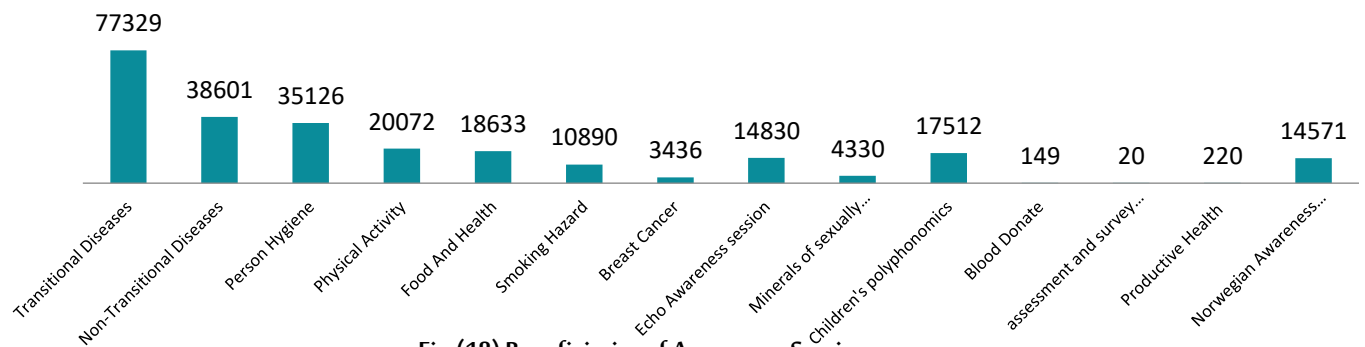
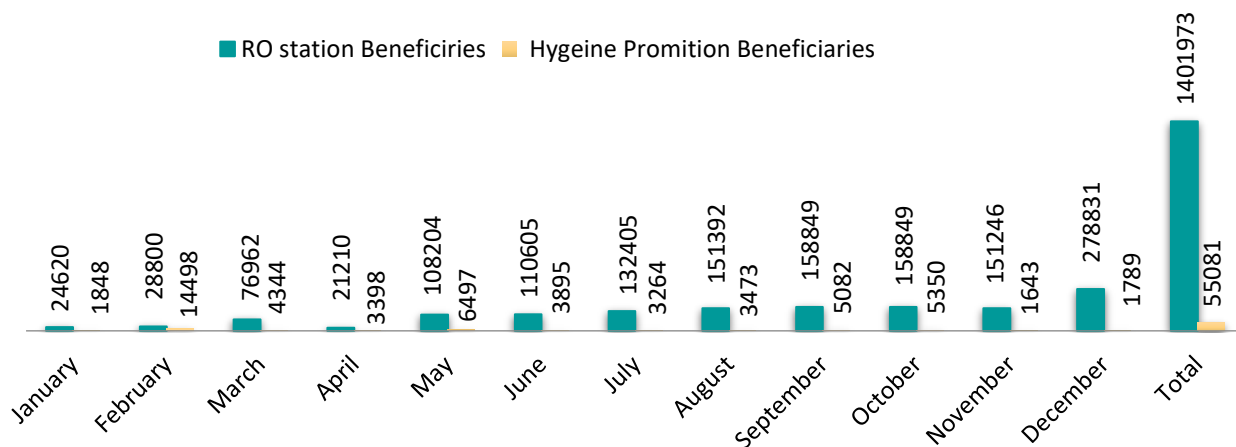


Fig.(18) Beneficiaries of Awareness Session

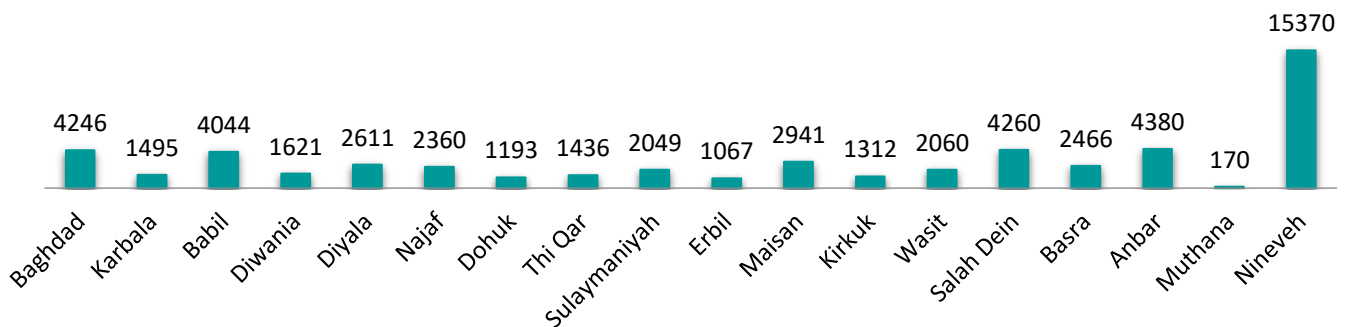


**3-Water and Sanitation Program:**

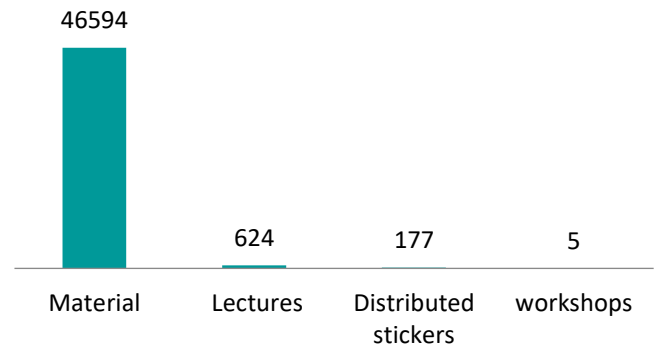
**Fig. (21) Beneficiaries from Hygiene Promotion in each governorate**

Iraqi Red Crescent teams in the processing of potable water through the installation of water desalination plants RO 42 and water filter units for emergency response (M5) 86 and distribution of drinkable water stations and water transport through basin cars, where Fig. (20) shows the number of beneficiaries of water plants (1,401,973) individuals and (55,081) beneficiaries of hygiene awareness lectures through (1,400) activities and as shown Fig. (21) and the amount of water distributed (26,722,316 liters) per year. water coolers and 12-25 liter/hour water stations are equipped in Mosul schools, as well as rehabilitation of health facilities. A cultural center in Duhok, as well as the distribution of 15



**Fig. (20) Beneficiaries from WASH program by months**

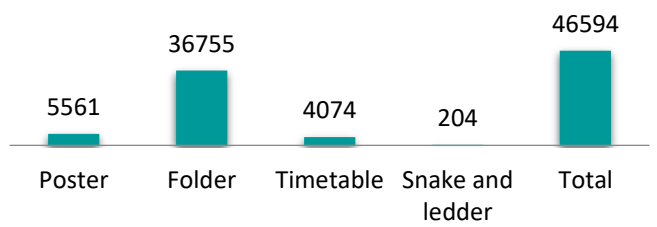


**4-War Remnants Awareness:**

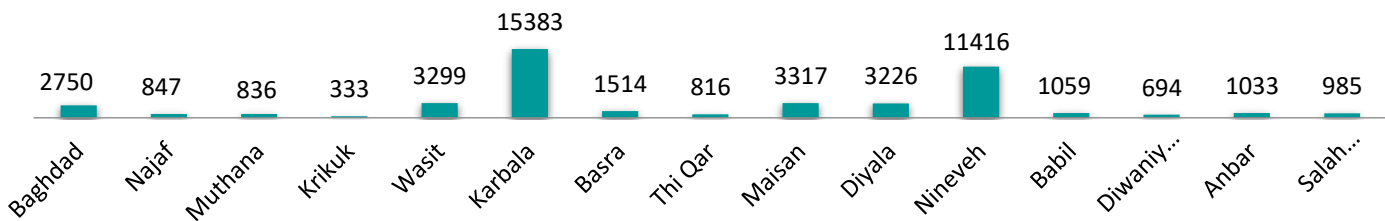

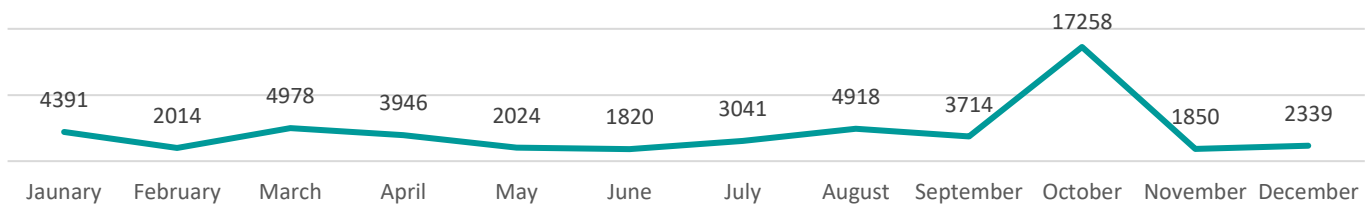
**Fig. (22) Publication and lectures in 2019**

The program aims to increase the awareness of the local community and reduce the damage caused by the remnants of war and thus reduce the number of victims, especially children, and this is done by changing behavior and wrong practices when facing danger, carrying out activities in fifteen provinces except the northern provinces (Erbil, Sulaymaniyah, Duhok) through teams of trained staff and volunteers to give awareness lectures and hold sports festivals, drawing exhibitions and workshops, as well as the distribution of publications for the program of brochures, posters or paper games for the purpose of educating children about the dangers of mines and shows Fig. (22) The quantities of distributed publications, trials and workshops implemented during 2019. The total number of published publications (46,594) detailed in Fig. (23) and the total number of beneficiaries of the program (49,954) according to Fig (25), including (17,906) females and (32,052) male males. **Fig.(25) beneficiaries from ERWA program by month**

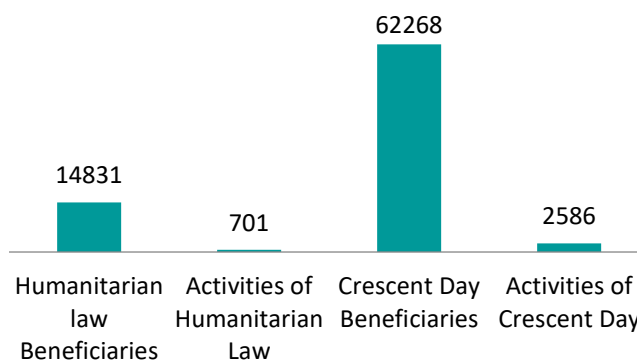


**5-Dissemination Program :**

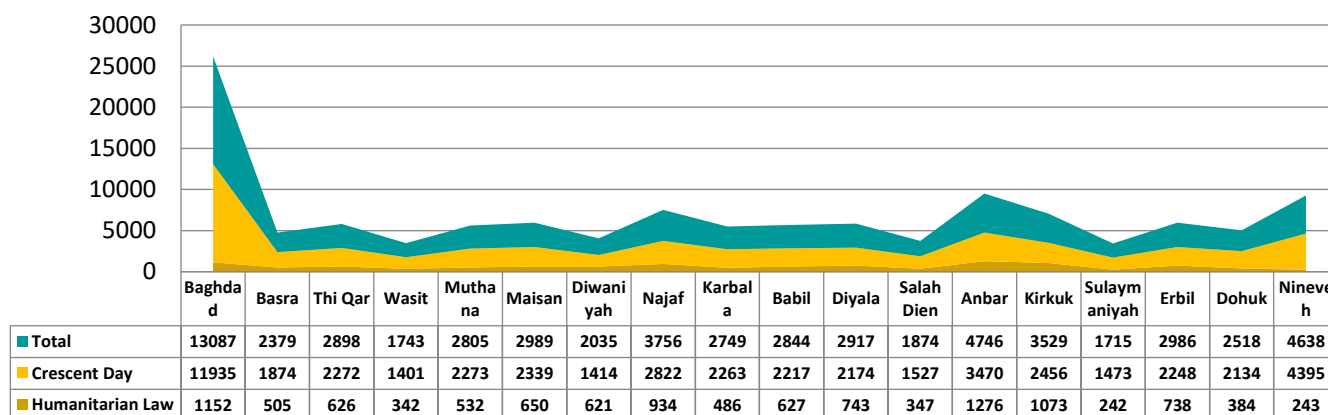

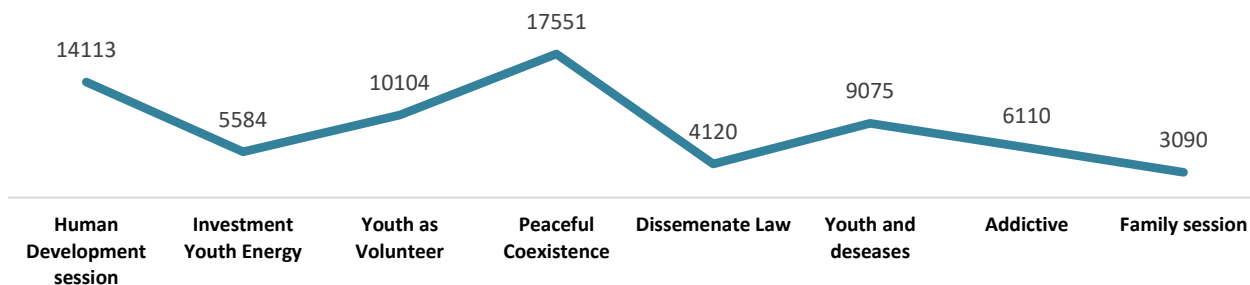
**Fig. (27) Beneficiaries in each governorate**

The activities carried out through this program are Crescent Day and International Humanitarian Law as described below, and the number of participants (77,099) including (28,643) females through (3287) activities distributed throughout the provinces of Iraq as described in Fig. (27)

- Crescent Day activities: aims to spread the principles of the international movement of the Red Cross and red crescent and introduce its components and the emblems used in it and its implications in addition to the task of introducing the Iraqi Red Crescent Society history and objectives and activities. reached people of Participants (62,268) individuals by (2,586) activity as described in Fig. (26)

- Activities of international humanitarian law: aims to spread international humanitarian law and its rules and applications and the number of participants (14,831) people through (701) activities as described Fig. (26) while Fig. (27) below shows the number of participants in the provinces of Iraq.



**Fig. (26) beneficiaries from Dissemination Program**

**6-Youth Program:**

The Iraqi Red Crescent Society activities are characterized by the diversity of youth programs, target groups and focus on the idea of peace and peaceful coexistence in the implementation of activities and the development of community skills through integrating them into courses conducted through coordinators and volunteers. The total beneficiaries (66,600) include (39,746) male and (26,854) female, by (1927) activity and Fig. (28) below the number of beneficiaries according to the months and Fig. (29) beneficiaries of the activities accomplished during this program. The activities of this program consist of:

- Young people as leaders: This activity consists of several events, debates and workshops (human wishing, investing the energies of young people, youth as volunteers) and the number of beneficiaries (26,854) individuals through (1011) activities
- Youth and Peace: This activity consists of several events and debates and workshops (peaceful coexistence, spreading the culture of law) and the number of beneficiaries (18,843) individuals through (346) activities
- Awareness and community: This activity consists of several events and workshops (youth and community diseases, addiction, family) and the number of beneficiaries (20,843) individuals through (570) activities

**7 -Family Link Program/Tracing:**

The lack of security in the country and the occurrence of displacements, and the severe suffering of displaced families, some families were forced to migrate outside Iraq in the hope to be safer, stable and better services will be found. However, illegal immigration has worsened the humanitarian situation and endangered the lives of many, and based on our principles in the international movement of red cross and red crescent societies, they are keen to protect the lives of civilians. The central tracing program aims to reconnect families and the total number of beneficiaries of this program (24,203). As described below:

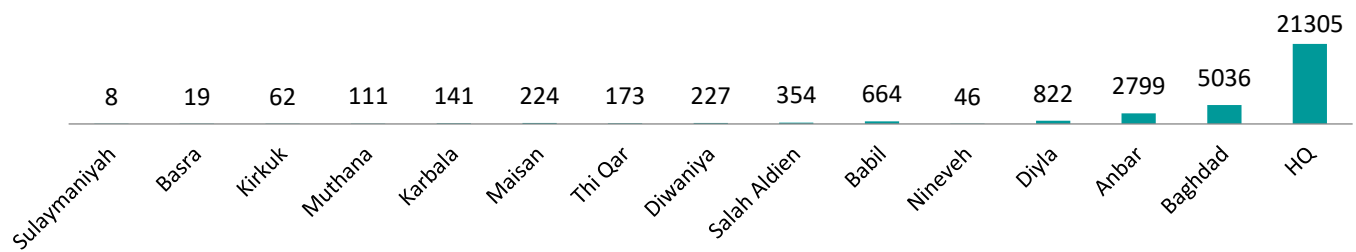
- Providing services :we received a lot of requests from families about the requests of families and the number of requests (32,132) individuals as described in Fig. (30)



- Securing the exchange of family news and the fate of the missing persons from the displaced groups in coordination and cooperation with the Belgian Red Cross, the German Red Cross, the British Red Cross, the American Red Cross, the Irish Red Cross and the Saudi Red Crescent on the search for some of the missing and reached Number of requests received (7) requests

- Providing family certificates to prisoners of war, where the number of beneficiaries (1604)

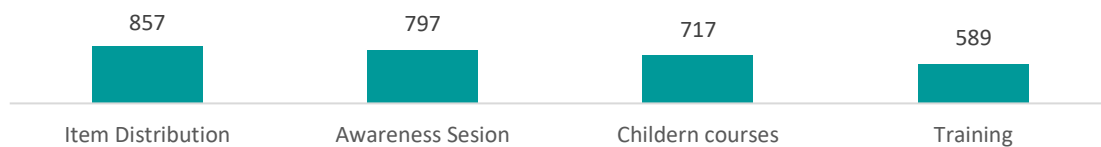

#### 8-Communication and community development Program

The basis of the work of the national societies is their volunteers and because we are entrusted to ourselves to have volunteers from every Iraqi house and our goal is to reach one million volunteers and more across the country,, foundation Development and communication forum in all provinces since the beginning of the second quarter of 2018. The volunteer teams working with this program, it works to identify strengths and weaknesses and coordinate field work with the rest of the programs, in all provinces of Iraq in order to improve our capacity to respond to the needs of the most affected groups and where volunteers of these programs are the key element to achieve achievements and implement activities The Iraqi Red Crescent Society and the number of activities carried out by them (2,960) as described in Fig. (31) and the number of beneficiaries (235,454) individuals

#### 9-Women Empowerment Program:

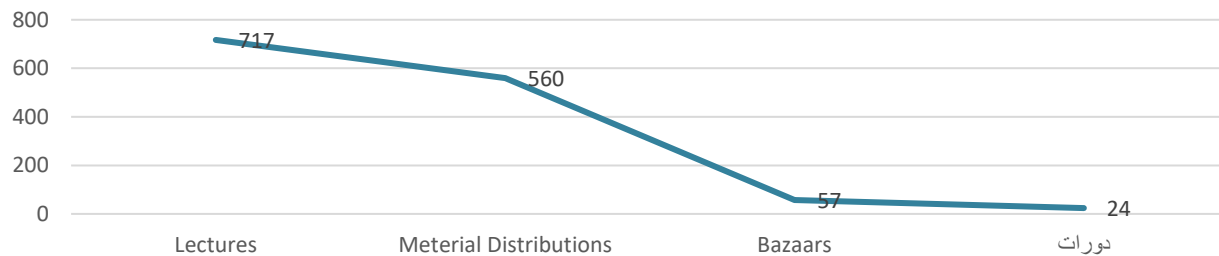


Fig. (32) the beneficiaries from Women Empowering Program

The program provides free health awareness services to support women, which play a key role in the preparation of a healthy generation and the total number of beneficiaries (1,358) as described in fig. (32):

- The women's organization promotes through art exhibitions that target women with dependents for their families and the opportunity for them to open income-generating projects in addition to educating these families against the diseases that are recently spreading by supporting community health programs and breast cancer is one of the most diseases currently prevalent among girls. The organization took it upon itself to pay close attention to the subject and carried out several campaigns



- Participating in programs to empower women and young women throughout Iraq, where the women's organization participated in our association with many activities to support and empower women to reflect on their projects and target the local community with international and local organizations
- Awareness-of-medication awareness of the right use of medicines
- Reproductive health awareness debates
- Personal hygiene awareness workshops for children Distribution of bags for women and children with special needs
- Mini-project management course to empower and support women economically
- A course on the dangers of cyber-extortion and proper ways to prevent and reduce them
- Awareness on viral hepatitis using Community-based health and first aid

#### 10-Our offices outside Iraq:

The Iraqi Red Crescent Society provides services to Iraqis outside Iraq in neighboring countries such as Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and Iran, through its offices outside Iraq and in coordination and cooperation with national societies and the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, in turn contributing to strengthening Our relationship with medical departments, hospitals and health centers in neighboring countries and we explain below the type of medical assistance available in each of our offices outside Iraq

- Medical program in Syria coordination with The Bahman Clinic and Relief in Damascus, it provides services to every Iraqi who proves his identity with a passport, which includes (medical examination, conducting necessary analyses - conducting ultrasound and radiation images - dental treatments - first aid services - dispensing medicine) and the number of Iraqis benefiting from medical services The treatment is 648 individuals at a cost of \$7,500, including 321 males and 327 females.

- Medical program in Lebanon in coordination with the Al-Taki Medical Center in Beirut and provides services to Iraqis and includes (medical examinations - conducting necessary analyses - conducting radiation images - providing advisory services in the internal specialties, children, women, urinary tract, bones and joints - and the number of Iraqi medical and medical services beneficiaries 165 individuals at a cost of \$7,232



- Medical program in Iran in coordination with the government hospitals, the Iraqi Red Crescent Society to refer patients who meet the conditions of referral for treatment outside Iraq for treatment at the expense of the society in hospitals in sober hospitals after confirming the inability of the condition for treatment inside Iraq, the patient is sent with one of the escorts and the society bears all the Travel, accommodation and treatment costs

- Medical program in Oman in coordination with the Jordanian Red Crescent Hospital, the Iraqi Red Crescent Society is conducting the Amman Office to treat eligible Iraqi patients and after going through laboratory tests, the hospital is treated in coordination with the Jordan Red Crescent Society and the number of beneficiaries reached 124 individuals.

Benin :

A year-old Iraqi girl lies in the Hospital, although she has been in hospital for a long time, but she has not recovered and has not improved her health to the extent that she has run out of money for her parents, the hospital has informed her parents of the need to get her out of the hospital immediately, but her parents do not have any money to get her out or to go somewhere else. Her parents came to the Office of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society and the Iraqi Embassy in Lebanon for help. The Office of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society coordinated with the hospital, Iraqi Airways, Lebanese Airways and the Iraqi Embassy to transport the child to a hospital in Baghdad with her relatives, but Benin's poor health had to remain for several days in the hospital and after her health improved, she was immediately transferred to Iraq. Under the conditions set by the hospital, which called for the provision of several equipment, a doctor and a nurse during the flight to accompany the child, the Iraqi Red Crescent Society had a special role to bear all the costs of transporting the child and paying the wages resulting from the child's stay in the hospital and providing equipment and transportation of her family and escorts from Lebanon To Iraq. The child's family thanked both the Iraqi Embassy and the Office of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society in Lebanon for their hearing and stand with them in overcoming this crisis successfully and cooperatively





Capacity and Capability

1-Logistic Capacity:

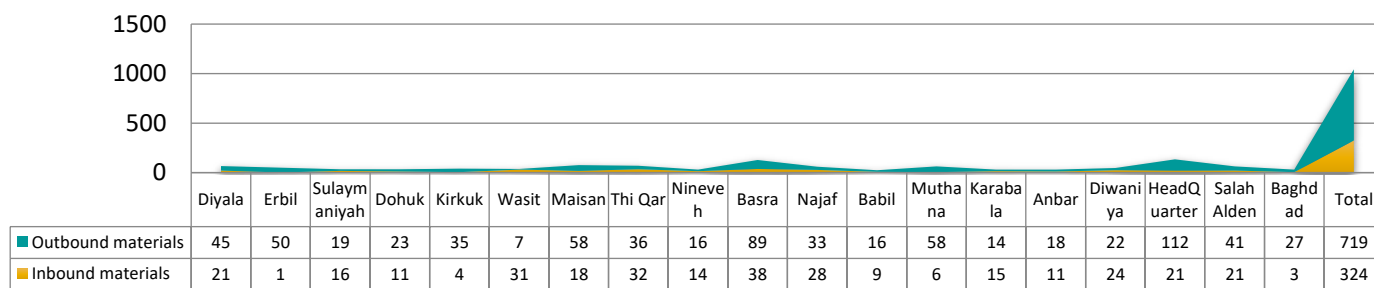


Fig. (33) Stored Transaction

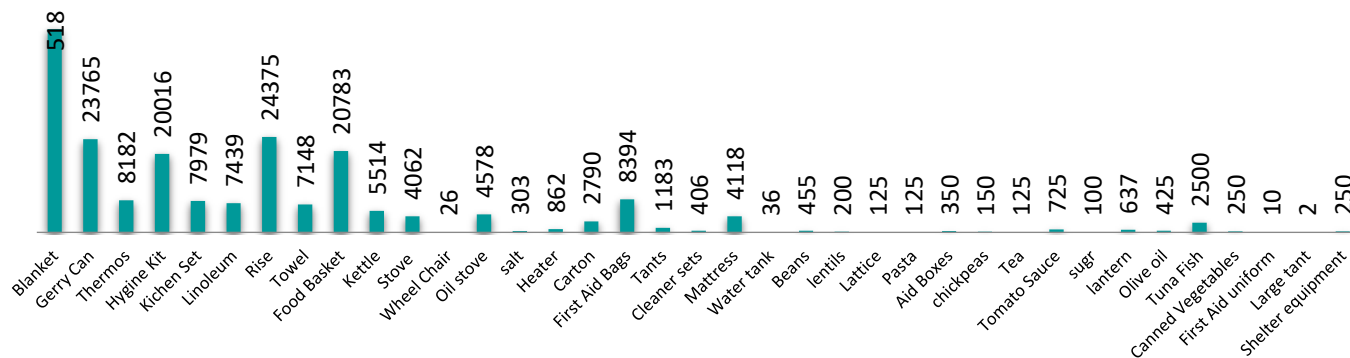


Fig. (34) Meterial Quantity Distributed

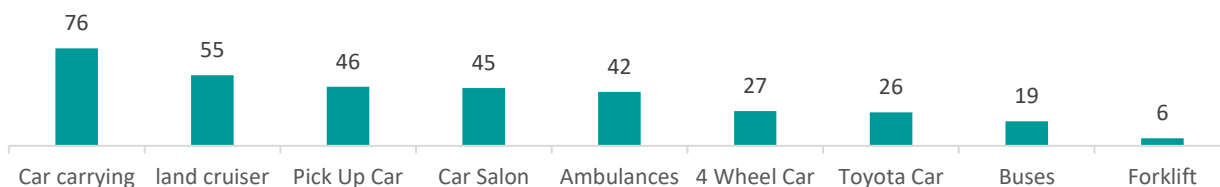


Fig.(35) Transport fleet

The Red Crescent Society has seven strategic stores in the provinces (Baghdad, Salah al-Din, Babylon, Diwaniyah, Basra, Kirkuk and Erbil) and seven stores belonging to the headquarters in Baghdad and a warehouse in the headquarters of each branch and shows Fig. (33) below the movement of storage materials, while the Fig. (34) shown the amount of materials distributed from the association's stores throughout Iraq and in cooperation with partners (ICRC, The Norwegian Red Cross, Danish Red Cross and Japanese Government Grant) the stock of our society's warehouses has been strengthened and to assist the communities. Our association has a transport fleet of 341 vehicles as described in Fig. (35).

2 -Engineering and Investment Program:

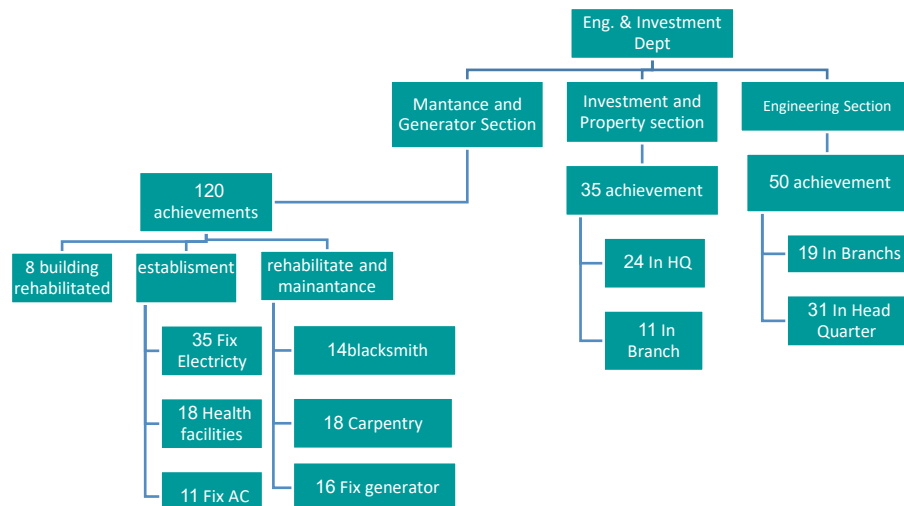


Fig.(36) Overall achievements

The engineering and property program seeks to maintain and rehabilitate the buildings, hospitals and health centers of the association and participate the rest of the programs in terms of the rehabilitation of buildings and health foundations and the implementation of sustainable investment projects. Follow-up of the revenues of investment buildings and the plan Fig. (36) shows the total achievements of the engineering and investment program. 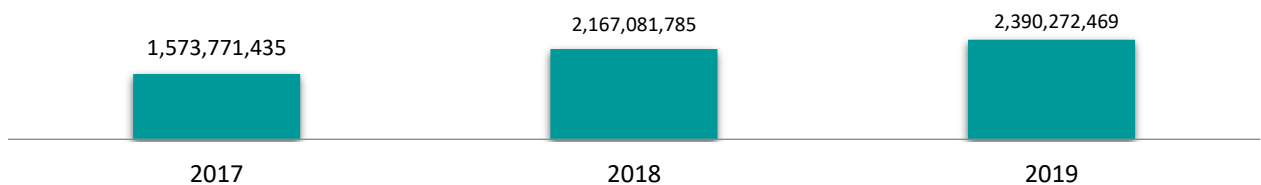


Fig. (37) Income for 2017-2018-2019



3 -Partner Support:

Many partners have contributed to supporting The Iraqi Red Crescent Society's projects and programs, including projects that have been going on for years, including the Development Program of the Office of United Nations Affairs, the World Health Organization, the German Red Cross, the Swedish, Norwegian, Danish and French. The Japanese, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, the International Committee of the Red Cross, the Japanese Government, the Empress of Shokin, the Turkish and Kuwaiti Red Crescent and others, while Fig. (38) shows the contributions of the partners to the agreements signed at the beginning of 2019 and the amount of support by Each partner, as this support is dedicated to programs and projects subject to international standards





#### 4 -Organization Development and Capacity Building:

The institutional development department consists of four divisions with a standard structure of 16 workers in addition to the director of the department, where the people are (Planning and Evaluation Division - Development Division - Reporting Division - Training Division). The Department of Institutional Development works to change the methodology of work in the association to a modern methodology by changing the paper systems to electronic and building capacity for workers and volunteers and planning in accordance with strategic objectives and future vision and the planning is based on results in addition to the follow-up and evaluation of work and activities implemented and not implemented as well as communicating with local and international partners for the purpose of providing support and exchange of experiences to develop the institutional reality in the society for the better. During 2019, the implementation of the activities was completed in accordance with our strategic objectives and as described below:

##### 1-Planning and evaluation:

- Support all departments and branches in preparing their annual plans or proposals for their new projects.
- Contribute to the preparation of the following plans and project proposals: (NISA Investment Alliance Grant - Japanese Government Grant - Empress Shokin Grant - USAID Grant - King Salman Center Grant / Kingdom of Saudi Arabia - and THE EUROPEAN UNION ECHO Grant - Australian Government Grant) i.e. a total of seven project proposals sent to the relevant authorities.
- The annual plan of our association for 2020 was prepared in coordination with all relevant departments
- Follow-up on the implementation of the 2019 plan.
- Emphasizing that sections and branches are bound by the project proposal model prepared by the Department of Institutional Development in accordance with the international federation's standards.
- Recruit the 16 team that was prepared and trained in 2018 to support planning processes in all departments and branches.
- Support the women's organization in preparing their plans.

##### 2-Development:

- Prepare a draft code of conduct code of conduct (based on the Code of Conduct).
- Prepare a draft update of the current job description
- Support the financial and administrative development program with the support of the Norwegian Red Cross and the international partners of the Society to support the society's capacity and to promote transparency, credibility, oversight and integrity in the management of financial and human resources and the development of the system to electronic rather than paper.

##### 3-Reports:

- Prepare annual, quarterly and half-yearly periodic reports for all activities of the association.
- Follow-up the implementation and development of the IMS (Information Management System) program in cooperation with the U.S. organization iMMAP, where during 2019 the electronic information management system was completed from all aspects except the training of staff in the reporting units in the branches, which is scheduled to be organized in 2020 if support is provided for that training.
- Use advanced data collection and analysis software such as ODK-Kobo collect - Power BI. Preparing a bank for accurate and realistic information within the electronic information management program to enhance the ease of access to information by all the executive



departments and the management of the association quickly and contribute to the appropriate decision in accordance with the mandate of our association.

- Reporting on the Information Bank of the International Federation of FDRS
- Prepare reports on our association's response to the Syrian crisis in accordance with a unified electronic program with the International Federation in accordance with the Decision of the Council of Delegates SMCC No. 1 for 2015 to strengthen cooperation and coordination with the components of the international movement.
- Prepare daily information bulletins on the activities of the association to respond to civil unrest since October 2019
- Prepare special reports to the Arab Organization ARCO.

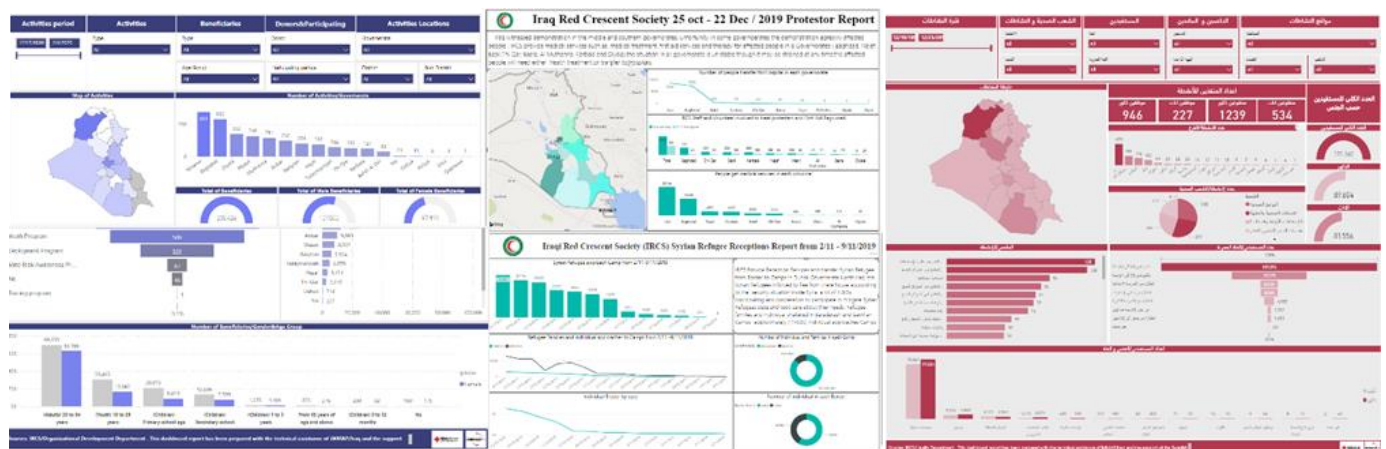
#### 4-Training and capacity-building:

- The total number of beneficiaries of capacity-building programs during 2019 (110) beneficiaries included (security access courses and emergency needs assessments and courses with the training center in the Financial Control Office and courses with the training center of the Ministry of Health)
- Prepare a database for all trainees working for the Iraqi Red Crescent Society for the last 10 years.
- Coordination with the Disaster Management Department and the International Committee of the Red Cross to carry out courses in the security access of workers in the departments and branches.
- Organize the TOT course for preparing trained trainers in coordination with the Ministry of Health, the 16 accredited trainers at Najaf Training Center and follow up and evaluate their work over a period of six months to build their abilities in the best way. Preparing proposals to build the capacity of the employees of the association.
- In coordination with iMMAP and the Swedish Red Cross, 23 staff trained on information management programs as a preliminary phase and 20 people were trained as a second stage to use the electronic information management system and train a 5-person team to be responsible for technical supervision of the program.
- Participating in country, regional and international courses at the level of the international movement to enhance the role of supervision and evaluation to monitor plans and projects and prepare the necessary reports for this and activate the role of innovation to develop programs, projects and activities.



**Success Story:**

The Iraqi Red Crescent Society has been willing to support the information management program in order to prepare a system capable of managing data in the field and to enhance the role of analysis of human needs to enhance the role of rapid and immediate response. In coordination with the Swedish Red Cross, iMMAP and the Institutional Development Department of our association, a program has been developed to collect, analyze and visualize data for all programs of a field nature and this program consists of a programming language for databases linked to a data entry interface and with Power Bi software, one of the programs supported by Microsoft of 365 grant to support national humanitarian societies to display, photograph and translate data into information. Coordination with the organization was to prepare interfaces in two Arabic and English languages to present a report on the data entered and extract edited and identify strengths and weaknesses and support follow-up and monitoring of the plans and projects accomplished and we can reach out to all types of partners and their contributions to support the humanitarian situation in Iraq and enhance the role of transparency and credibility and determine diversity and social type and age classification for all beneficiaries of our services activities and programs. The program was implemented for four months under trial to achieve the required effectiveness and train special teams to work on it through remote training for lack of cash flow, and try to reach correct and updated results on a daily basis. 1/1/2020 is the official launch of the program to work permanently and continuously. We look forward to seeking this change and motivating others to change as well.





## Outputs:

### 1-Annual Plan Achievement 2019:

The Iraqi Red Crescent Society launched an annual plan for 2019 at the beginning of the same year, which included many objectives, including:

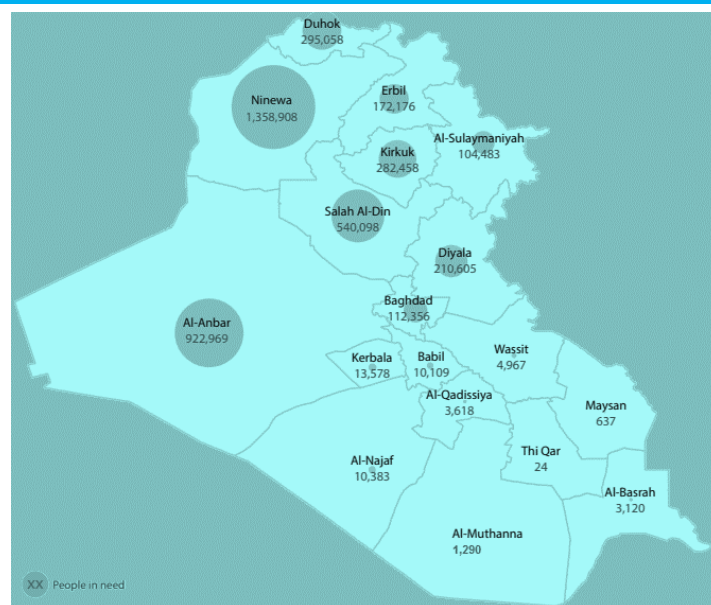
- 1- Implementation of all disaster preparedness program and providing basic needs for the families of displaced, returnees and the disabled, and the number of beneficiaries reached 744,551 members of food and relief distribution services in cooperation with international movement partners such as the Norwegian Red Cross and the International Committee of the Red Cross and the Danish Red Cross are outside the international movement of the Japanese government.
- 2- Implementation of all programs to strengthen the economic and health situation of the affected families through the cash transfer program in cooperation with the partners of the International Movement of the Norwegian Red Cross, the Danish Red Cross, the German Red Cross and the International Committee of the Red Cross and the number of beneficiaries 2 341 individuals.
- 3- Implementing all disaster risk reduction programs by educating local communities about all types of disasters for the purpose of mitigating the risk and increasing the resilience of the community by cooperation with IFRC and Japanese Government to support this program, the total number of beneficiaries reached 31,503 individuals.
- 4- The implementation of all awareness programs of explosive war remnants and that most of the activities are free and did not get support, but the ICRC participated in the development of the capacities and capabilities of this program by equipped it with some instruments and furniture, the number of beneficiaries reached 49,954 individuals
- 5- Implementation of capacity-building support programs for current volunteers for half of the target group due to the lack of financial support for this program due to the many crises and the orientation of the emergency response
- 6- Implementing programs to support and promote flexibility for local communities through programs to support youth, peaceful coexistence and awareness of community diseases and the number of beneficiaries reached 66,600 people, knowing that the activities are free of charge for lack of a partner to support the financial.
- 7- The infrastructure support and rehabilitation plan and support for long-term investment projects have not been welcomed by partners and the government due to the trend of emergency response, disaster situations during 2019
- 8- Implementation of all programs to publish the principles of the international movement and international humanitarian law and the number of beneficiaries reached 77,099 people, although the activities are free of charge for lack of a partner to support this program
- 9- Implementation of all tracing programs 22,853 individuals in cooperation with the International Committee of the Red Cross, although the activities are free of charge.
- 10- Implementation of all precautionary alert programs to reduce the risk of water pollution and scarcity in the installation and maintenance of water plants where the amount of water distributed was 30,807,866 liters
- 11- Implementing programs to support sustainable projects rehabilitation of 28 schools and health facilities to promote and maintain the personal hygiene of students and reduce the incidence of diseases resulting from lack of water or health facilities unfit for use.
- 12- Implementing the program to promote the safety in schools by rehabilitate health facilities as successful role to prepare students and staff capable of preserving their lives and property



- 13- Implementing programs to support the health status of the affected communities in cooperation with the partners of the international movement, including the Danish Red Cross, the Norwegian Red Cross, Empress Shokin and the German government (3,645,738) beneficiaries

**2-Analyze :**

During 2019, Iraq experienced significant security instability in the recent period, and the questionnaires showed that there are many areas in need of health services and reconstruction of infrastructure, especially drinking water, and this has affected physical and mental health and the ability to live properly. The Iraqi Red, in cooperation with its partners in the international movement and outside the international movement programs to promote flexibility and the social integration to the affected communities, but this is a simple thing in return for the scale of losses and needs increasing daily Especially in the camps for the displaced because they are the most needed in the camps of Nineveh, Anbar, Salah al-Din, Kirkuk and Diyala, and most of these families are not able to provide the basic requirements of life



until now. Because of their lack of access to health services, safe drinking water, sanitation, quality education and job opportunities, this has had a psychological impact on their lives and we as a national association have had a role in protecting their lives and preserving their dignity, and we note that the number of the most vulnerable is 40% lower compared to 2018 as explained. In the table below:

According to a report by the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs

Dr. Yassin Ahmed Abbas, President of the Iraqi Red Crescent Society, called on local and international organizations working in Iraq to unite plans, programs and projects that serve the affected communities and to work in coordination and cooperation with each other and to divide tasks, duties, implementation times and implementation areas in order to cover as many needy people as possible and to develop their capacities and capabilities by identifying humanitarian needs to provide the best services. Strengthening our strategic and operational plans in accordance with the seven international movement's objectives to focus on meeting the needs of the most vulnerable, including coordination and cooperation with government institutions as well as private entities to support the infrastructure of the most vulnerable groups of water, sanitation, health program, awareness to reduce disaster risk and end strong communities capable of recovery and resilience again, and therefore we find that the number of beneficiaries of our program for 2019 has increased significantly as shown in the table below:

We notice that the beneficiaries of each program are different compared to the previous year, and although many programs did not have financial support for them and most of them are free activities, but the correct management of resources and results-based management provided a lot of teams to attract the largest number of affected communities and reached the number of The total beneficiaries are 5,726,898 members of the total services provided by the Iraqi Red Crescent Society staff. Thanks to coordination and cooperation with our partners in the international movement and beyond to support emergency programs and the rapid response to the crises that hit Iraq during the past year 2019, but many affected communities still need support in health and food programs, livelihood programs and rehabilitation of structures. The infrastructure for potable water

#### Recommendations:

- 1- Continue to activate disaster risk reduction programs implemented by the operating theatres formed for this purpose and our volunteers in the forums of communication and development, the women's organization and the youth organization to prepare flexible and willing to face the risks and able to manage them themselves.
- 2- Strengthening and supporting the capacity-building of our volunteers and humanitarian workers to provide the best services and to suit the international movement of the Red Cross and Red Crescent movement.
- 3- Expanding the stock to respond to emergencies and activating an emergency plan in anticipation of the coming crises, such as some civil disturbances witnessed in some provinces of the center and south, the crisis of floods and coordination with our Partner for this purpose of obtaining granting of distress call.
- 4- Supporting the health situation of the affected communities by providing mobile clinics and medical centers to support the most vulnerable in the central and southern regions due to the crises in the region.
- 5- Promoting and supporting independent investment and sustainable projects to develop effective and sustainable programs to enhance resources and self-sufficiency for our association
- 6- Activating and strengthening coordination and cooperation with international and local humanitarian organizations to manage crises in Iraq in accordance with unified efforts by taking into account the implementation of the outputs of the Baghdad Conference of Humanitarian Organizations, which was established in late 2018 to develop the mechanisms of collecting and analyzing data and activating it on all organizations. Local and international humanitarian organization in Iraq to achieve a high level of efficiency in rapid response using data analysis systems and programs such as SPSS, Power Bi.
- 7- Adopting new programs to cover the continuing and renewed needs on the Iraqi scene, including programs to support innovation and electronic development and work to promote learning as well as mental health.



- 8- Activating and developing aspects of follow-up, monitoring and evaluation in humanitarian work mechanisms and tools through self-assessment programs, project evaluation, measuring the satisfaction of beneficiaries and attracting donors for this purpose
- 9- Strengthening the policies and machinery of attracting grants and managing them to enhance and increase the resources of the association through solid training centers and increase investment opportunities for the resources of the association in order to achieve increased resources.





### Conclusion

The hard work continues despite many humanitarian challenges which have increased the efforts and the determination of the staff and volunteers to achieve the humanitarian goal "one together." The humanitarian situation still needs more support and support from all components of the international movement and the international community.
