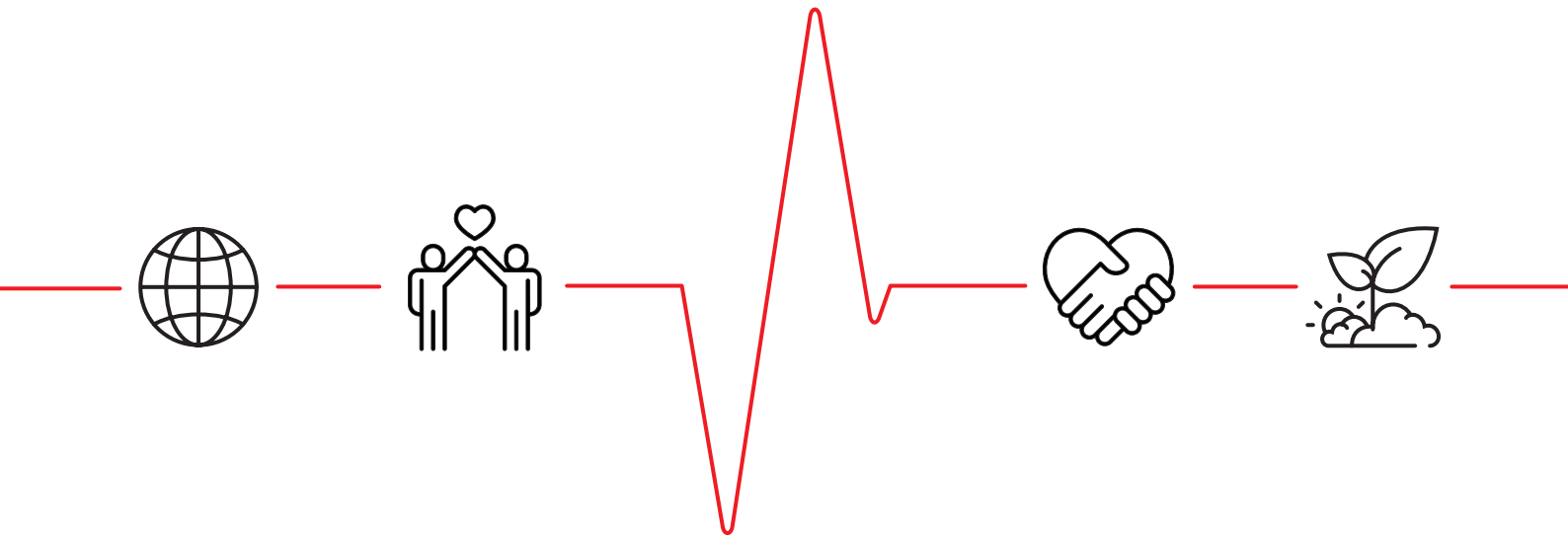

The Fundamental Principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement

International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement Fundamental Principles

Based on the following seven fundamental principles, the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement practices humanitarian movements of the Red Cross, as the National Societies, International Committee of the Red Cross and the International Federation of the Red Cross are united.

Humanity

The International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, born of a desire to bring assistance without discrimination to the wounded on the battlefield, endeavors, in its international and national capacity, to prevent and alleviate human suffering wherever it may be found. Its purpose is to protect life and health and to ensure respect for the human being. It promotes mutual understanding, friendship, cooperation and lasting peace amongst all peoples.

Impartiality

It makes no discrimination as to nationality, race, religious beliefs, class or political opinions. It endeavours to relieve the suffering of individuals, being guided solely by their needs, and to give priority to the most urgent cases of distress.

Neutrality

In order to continue to enjoy the confidence of all, the Movement may not take sides in hostilities or engage at any time in controversies of a political, racial, religious or ideological nature.

Independence

The Movement is independent. The National Societies, while auxiliaries in the humanitarian services of their governments and subject to the laws of their respective countries, must always maintain their autonomy so that they may be able at all times to act in accordance with the principles of the Movement.

Voluntary Service

It is a voluntary relief movement not prompted in any manner by desire for gain.

Unity

There can be only one Red Cross or one Red Crescent Society in any one country. It must be open to all. It must carry on its humanitarian work throughout its territory.

Universality

The International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, in which all Societies have equal status and share equal responsibilities and duties in helping each other, is worldwide.

Delivering miracles with warm hands

The Korean Red Cross practices humanity through the solidarity and cooperation of volunteers, RCY members, blood donors, and sponsors (companies, etc.).

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2022 was full of unexpected major disasters and humanitarian crises. As the pandemic intensified due to COVID-19, which began in 2019, voices calling for help continued in various domestic and international humanitarian crises such as climate change-related disasters and international armed conflicts in Ukraine.

In humanitarian crises, the Korean Red Cross continued to provide psychological first aid and psychosocial support, while fulfilling its role and duties as a public medical institution and disaster management organization. Starting with the collapse of an apartment building in Gwangju at the beginning of the year, the Korean Red Cross was the first to share the pain and help people recover when large fires broke out at factories in Ulsan and Chungbuk. We also carried out emergency relief and psychosocial support activities in flood-affected areas swept by record-breaking heavy rainfall in 100 years, typhoon Hinnamnor, and the heartbreaking Seoul Halloween crowd crush, including a series of wildfires in the East Coast. Red Cross staff, volunteers, and disaster psychosocial support activists strived to soothe the pain and sorrow of people who were trembling with anxiety and fear.

The Red Cross Hospitals designated as infectious disease hospitals have treated more than 120,000 patients. In particular, Incheon Hospital has strengthened its role as a public hospital by reopening the emergency room, being promoted to a general hospital, and opening Medical Center for All. Even in a situation where the number of blood donors was rapidly declining due to the prolonged COVID-19 pandemic, we have worked with the government and the National Assembly to activate group blood drives and improve access to individual blood donations and expand courtesy to stabilize the blood supply.

We also set out actively for international support. The Korean Red Cross carried out emergency relief activities in solidarity and cooperation with the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies (IFRC), and Red Cross National Societies in 192 countries around the world. We took the lead in saving lives by donating cash to Ukrainian people suffering from armed conflict and sending emergency relief supplies such as milk powder, winter supplies, and relief vehicles. Last July, in cooperation with the Romanian Red Cross, we opened a Humanity multicultural center for Ukrainian children and youth living in Romania. We were able to bring hope to the children who could smile again.

The Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement has always been with human beings in difficult times. As always, the Korean Red Cross will be the first to be there wherever there is human suffering. In order to quickly respond to sudden crises and disasters, we will strengthen the international cooperation system and gather the power of sharing. We will provide the utmost help to neighbors who have lost their daily lives and urge social interest. Remembering the essence of the humanitarian spirit, we will care for the lowest places in the world to prevent blind spots in welfare. While touching the pain of separated families who have not met their precious families for over 70 years due to the division of Korea, we will do our best to convey the warm hearts of those.

Under the humanitarian spirits, the Korean Red Cross respects human beings and saves lives. All of these activities are possible due to all the supporters, volunteers, and blood donors who support the Korean Red Cross. I would like to thank everyone who has been involved in the humanitarian action of the Korean Red Cross.

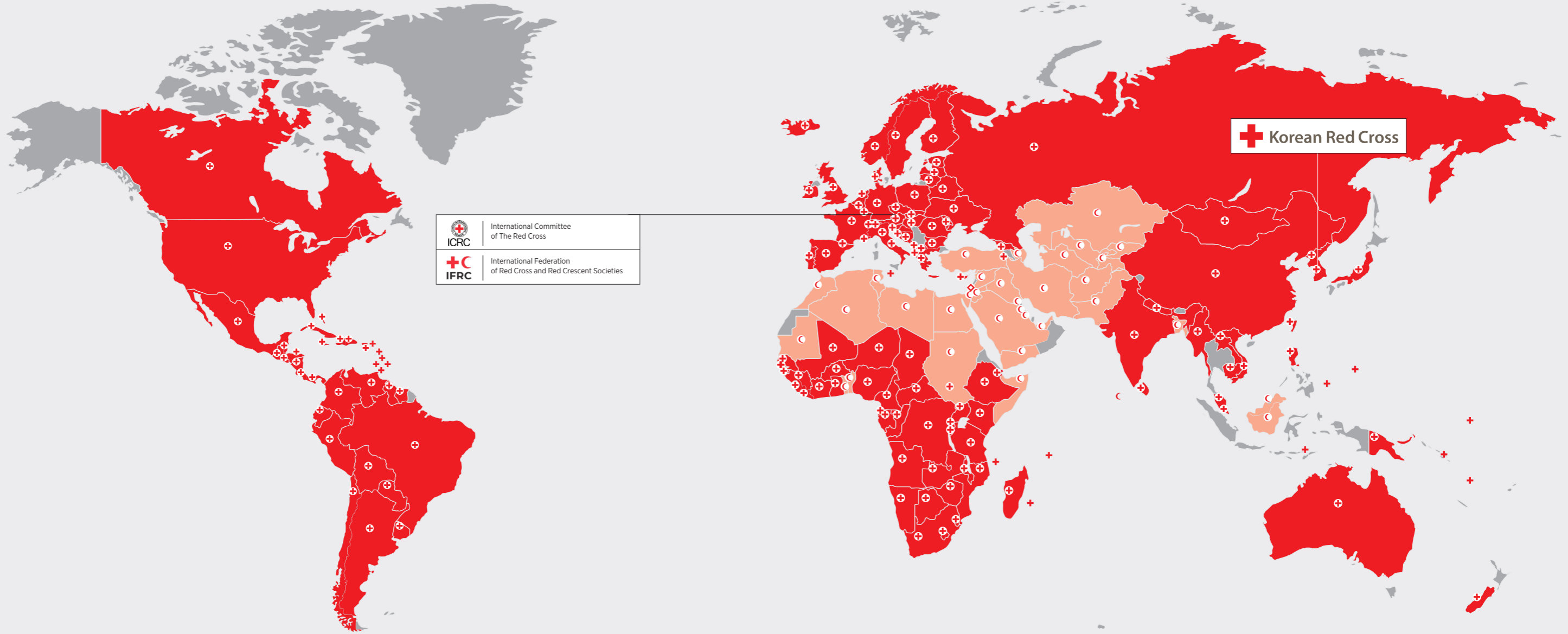

Humanitarian assistance to Ukraine Crisis

As the humanitarian crises in Ukraine has deepened since February 24 due to the armed conflict between Russia and Ukraine, the Korean Red Cross dispatched an on-site investigation team and an emergency response team for relief activities. We delivered emergency relief funds, vehicles, milk powder for infants and young children, winter products, and mattresses to Ukraine, and supported the operation of Humanity multicultural center for displaced people opened in Romania, a neighboring country. In addition, we signed business agreements with Koryoin support groups in Korea, such as Beyond and the Korean Association of Koryoin, to provide livelihood and medical care to Ukrainian people who entered Korea.

Emergency relief and damage support for massive wildfire in Uljin and Samcheok

In order to respond to the large-scale forest fire that started from Uljin on March 4 which spread to Samcheok, the Korean Red Cross carried out relief activities for ten days to the 13th when the main blaze extinguished. We provided relief supplies and emergency shelters for private spaces for victims, and prepared meals to 46,805 victims and firefighters. Through psychosocial support for victims who lost their homes, we shared the pain. By signing a business agreement with the Korea Forest Service, we jointly promoted forest ecological restoration in areas affected by wildfires and created 'Donor's Forest' in April 2023

Capacity Strengthening as public health institutions

Incheon, Tongyeong, and Geochang Red Cross Hospitals have been designated as regional medical institutions responsible for the health and medical care of residents in each region. Gyeongin Regional Rehabilitation Hospital was promoted from a nursing hospital to a general hospital. Incheon Red Cross Hospital also reopened its emergency room in October, converted all wards into integrated nursing care wards, and was promoted to a general hospital on December 1 by operating 12 departments in total. The 7 Red Cross Hospitals of the Korean Red Cross will strengthen their capabilities as public medical institutions and continue to lead public medical care for the medically vulnerable groups.

Blood Services re-designated as WHO Collaboration Centre

The Korean Red Cross Blood Services was re-designated as a World Health Organization (WHO) Collaboration Centre. It is the second re-designation following the first re-designation in 2018 after the initial designation in 2014. For four years, from 2022 to 2026, Korean Red Cross Blood Services is going to carry out activities such as the development of capacity building tools for blood projects in the Western Pacific region, technical support for securing safe blood products development and distribution of educational materials for voluntary non-remunerated blood donation, etc. with WHO. Meanwhile, blood donation certificates newly issued from September 24 under the amendment of the Blood Management Act can be reissued once in case of damage or loss, increasing the convenience of blood donors.

Emergency relief activities for heavy rain in the central region and typhoon Hinnamnor

Heavy rainfall in the central region in August and Typhoon Hinnamnor in the southern region in September caused miserable casualties and enormous property damage. The Korean Red Cross, a disaster management organization and a relief support organization, has conducted emergency relief activities in the metropolitan area as well as in Gangwon, Chungnam, Chungbuk, Daejeon/Sejong, and Gyeongbuk to respond to the damage from the typhoon and heavy rainfall. We sent our employees and volunteers to the affected areas to provide shelters, emergency relief items, emergency food kits, blankets, etc. prepared meals for victims and relief workers, and dispatched mobile shower and laundry vehicles to help victims return to their daily lives as soon as possible.

'HEY! We Change the World' Humanitarian Education Program Certified by the Ministry of Education

Experience-based humanitarian education program "HEY! We Change the World", which was produced by the Korean Red Cross based on the fundamental principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement for personality development and healthy growth of adolescents, was certified as a character education program by the Ministry of Education. The Korean Red Cross contributes to the development of youth personality by deploying humanitarian instructors to elementary, middle, and high schools that wish to participate in the program, free of charge, to provide experiential education that promotes humanitarian values such as non-violence, gender, non-discrimination, diversity, listening, and empathy.

The 1st Blood Donation Voucher Scholarship

The Korean Red Cross Blood Services has distributed 465 million Korean won scholarships to 465 students nominated by their respective high schools. The Blood Donation Voucher Scholarship Program, which started in 2022 for the first time, provides scholarships to high school students who have difficulty continuing their studies until graduation through the donation of blood donation vouchers, in which donors donate a corresponding amount in exchange for receiving a souvenir. Recipients were selected from all over the country through the scholarship recommendation committee for each school with the cooperation of each city and the provincial office of education, and the students will receive a scholarship of KRW 1 million every year for the next three years.

Psychosocial support for Seoul Halloween Crowd Crush

Due to Seoul Halloween Crowd Crush on October 29, not only people were at the site, but all who encountered photos and videos of the scene through news and social media were exposed to the risk of trauma. The Korean Red Cross, which operates 17 city and provincial disaster psychological recovery support centers nationwide to support the psychological stability and social adjustment of those who have experienced disasters, has provided online and offline psychological first aid and professional psychological counseling to those who have experienced indirectly through disaster sites, shopping malls near Itaewon, and mass media since October 31. In addition, the Korean Red Cross has further strengthened CPR training for the people.

Wherever there are human beings and whenever there is suffering, the Korean Red Cross devotes itself to all humanitarian activities to protect precious lives and alleviate human suffering.

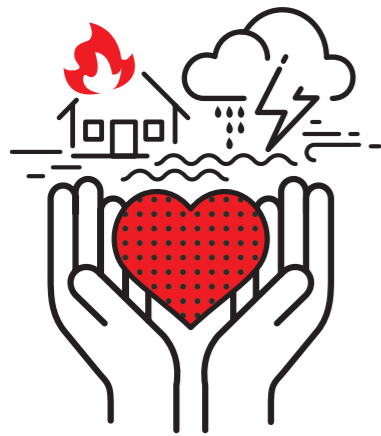

* Water Trap refers to a small puddle in the forest where trees, soil, and stones are piled up to prevent water from draining. This concept uses the principle if rainwater is stored in water traps in various places in the forest, the forest will retain enough moisture for hydration.

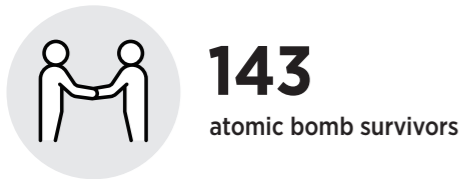

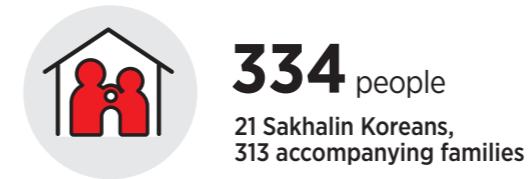

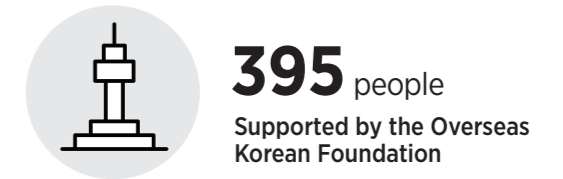
Support Permanent Return and Settlement of Sakhalin Koreans

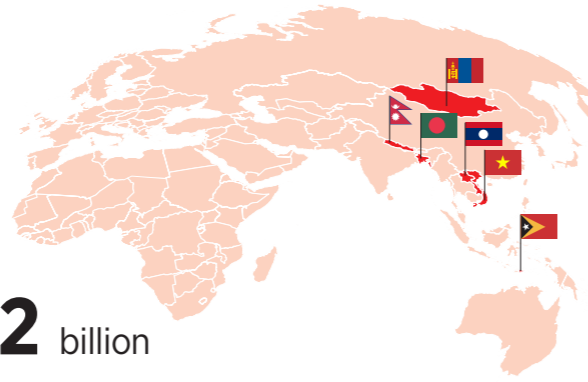

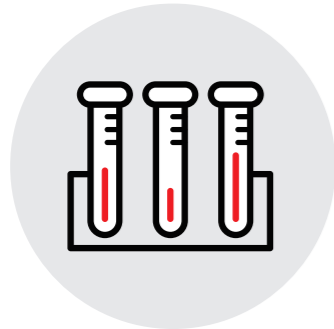


Inter-Korean Cooperation

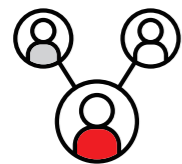

Windmill of Hope Network



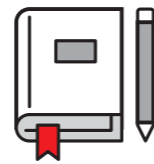

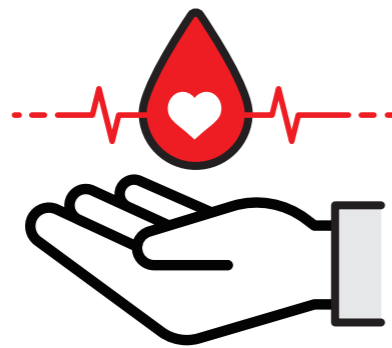

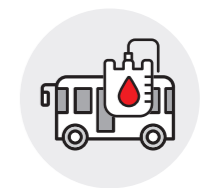

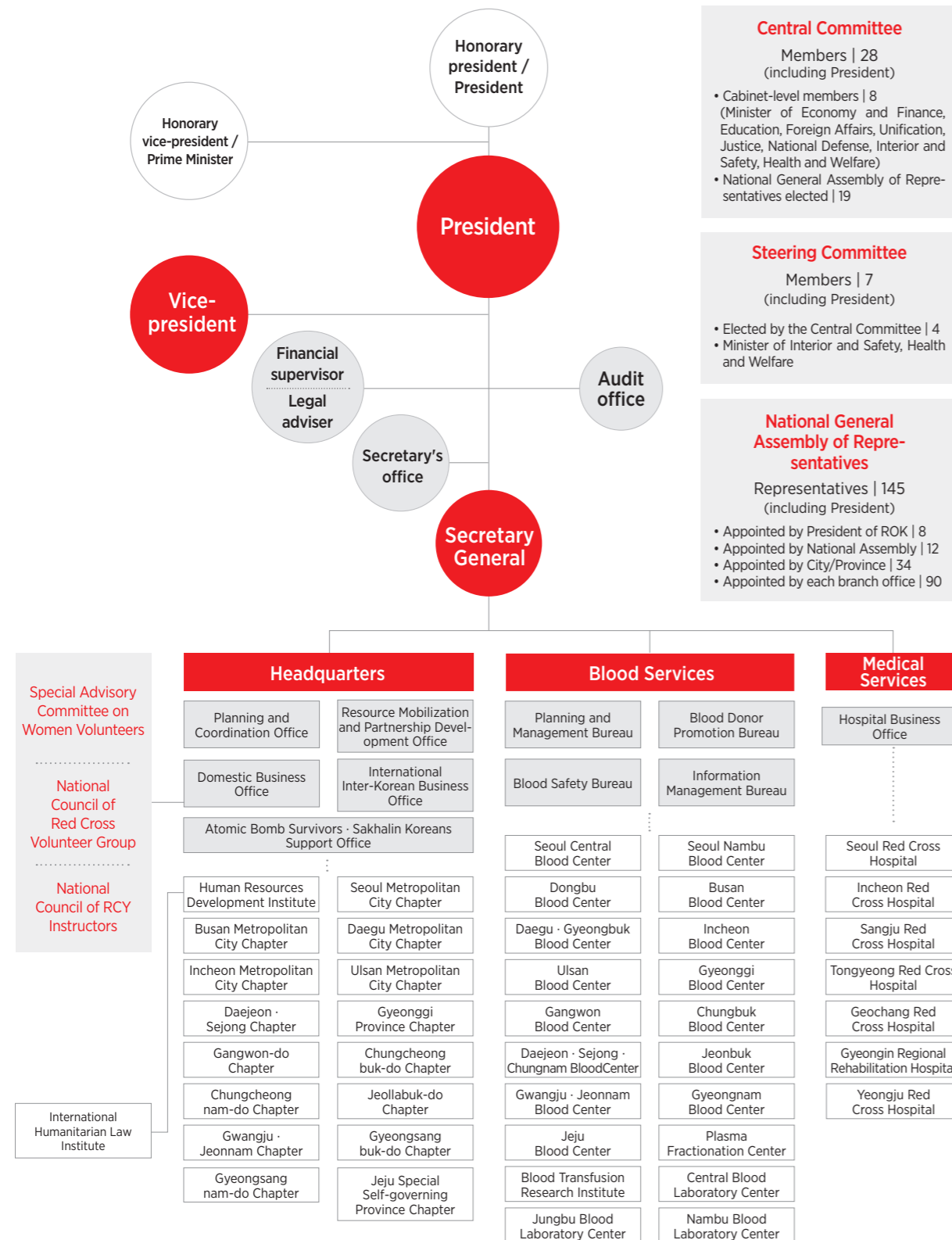

How does Korean Red Cross verify whether it spends the donations transparently?

As a non-classified public institution defined under the Act on the Management of Public Institutions, Korean Red Cross has been thoroughly verified for its transparency of projects by the National Assembly, Board of Audit and Inspection, external accounting companies, and through internal audit. We constantly monitor our fundraising and expenditure processes.



How is financial and accounting management of Korean Red Cross performed?

Korean Red Cross has established a system to reinforce internal control through the innovation of financial processes and has committed to secure reliability by introducing International Financial Reporting Standards(IFRS) as a non-profit organization for the first time in Korea.



Can the public view the information managed by Korean Red Cross?

Korean Red Cross provides its information in the form of viewing, duplicating, or reproducing upon persons' request following the official Information Disclosure Act. Korean Red Cross also offers information voluntarily as public announcements under the provisions of laws and regulations.

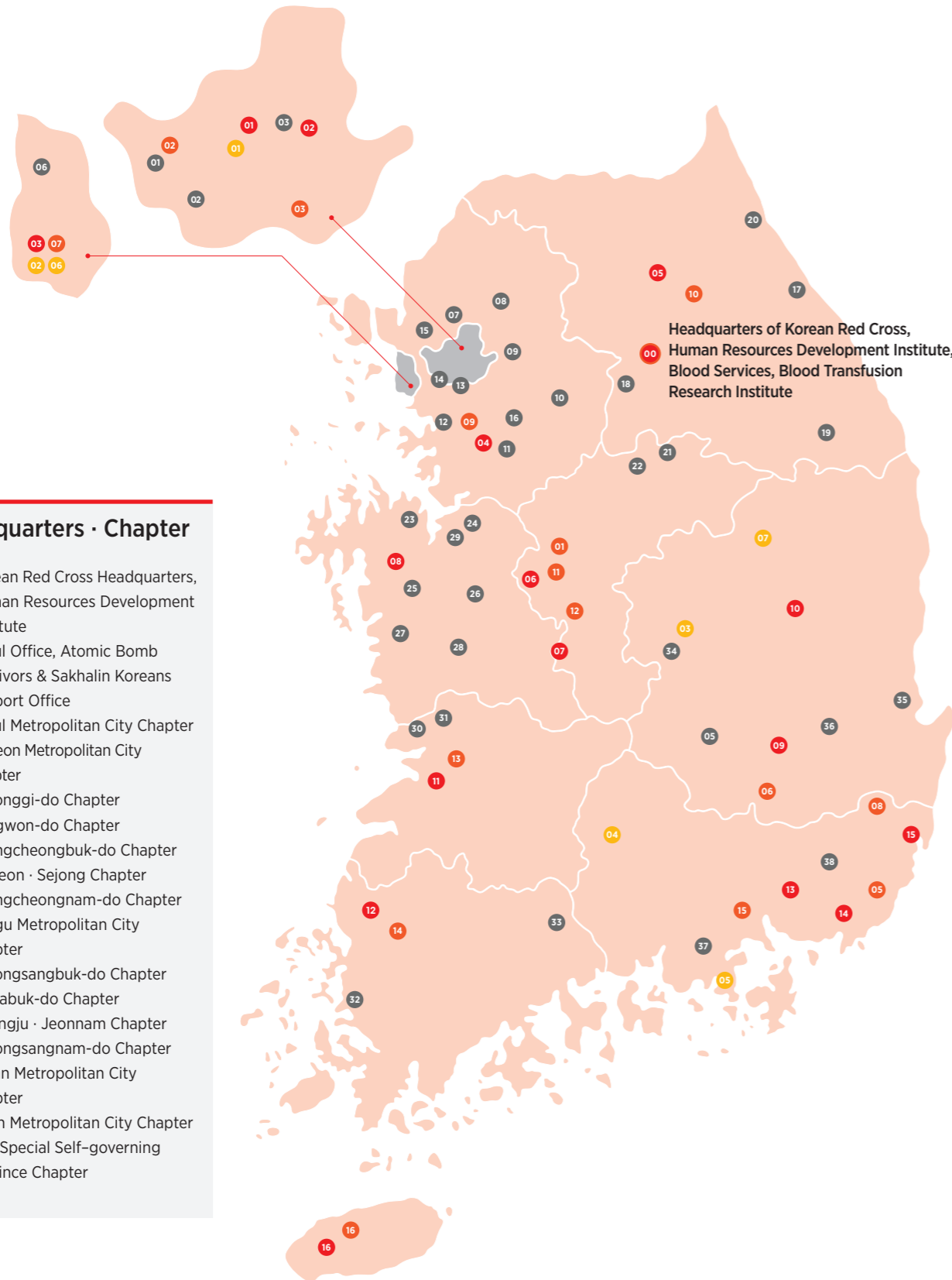
