Introduction

The Sudanese Red Crescent Society was established by a decision of the Council of Ministers in 1956 in response to international legislation stipulating the establishment of national societies in independent countries in response to international requirements in humanitarian work and the texts of the four Geneva Conventions of 1949..

The association carries out its various humanitarian activities through its volunteers spread throughout all the states of Sudan in accordance with the seven fundamental principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, which revolve around enhancing our uniqueness and ensuring the effective and transparent accomplishment of our missions. The most prominent of these principles are independence, neutrality and impartiality. This is to ensure that humanitarian aid reaches those who deserve it, away from political, religious, ethnic or sectarian purposes or motives..

The association has many joint activities that it implements in cooperation with a number of ministries and relevant bodies..The Sudanese Red Crescent Society has 18 branches in the different states of Sudan, where its activities cover all the states of Sudan and not just Khartoum State through volunteers spread throughout all the states of Sudan..

The Society's activities are funded by partners from the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, namely the International Committee of the Red Cross, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and a number of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies. Its activities are also funded by a number of United Nations organizations, some international non-governmental organizations and donors, in addition to members' subscriptions.

The association coordinates annually with the Civil Defense in preparing for and responding to disasters, as its plan is included in the national plan for civil defense. The association participates in all periodic meetings of the Council's emergency room and participates in all emergency intervention activities across the branches..

The Society is also a member of the Technical Emergency Committee headed by the Minister of Social Development. It participates in all committee meetings, submits emergency reports, and coordinates the distribution of relief in emergency situations. The Minister of Social Development participated in launching some convoys that were directed to areas affected by floods last year, as one of the relevant ministries. The Red Crescent Society works as an auxiliary body to the state in humanitarian work and on a wide geographical scale, to cover the entire country through its branches (currently 18 branches) in the states, with regard to providing humanitarian services in peace and war situations, in accordance with its obligations under the Geneva Conventions of 1949.

In peacetime:

The Sudanese Red Crescent Society provides humanitarian assistance to vulnerable and needy groups and victims of accidents and disasters. It also organizes awareness and first aid programs, combating epidemics, protecting against them, and reducing their risks..

In time of war:

The Sudanese Red Crescent Society works to evacuate and treat the wounded and sick, assist war victims, prisoners and their families, provide relief and first aid to victims, shelter and protect the displaced, restore family ties, disseminate international humanitarian law and raise awareness of it in society in general and in conflict areas in particular, as well as disseminate the fundamental principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement..

The Sudanese Red Crescent Society plays a prominent leading role in disaster preparedness and response through its rapid intervention to help those affected by its volunteers who carry out evacuation operations, field surveys, provide relief and shelter assistance, provide clean water, environmental sanitation and first aid services. This is due to the society's readiness to confront disasters by preparing its plans and training

volunteers, forming a central emergency room and emergency rooms in its branches in the states, in addition to close coordination with its partners from within the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, United Nations agencies, civil society organizations and relevant parties..

The association annually responds to natural disasters, floods, epidemics and conflicts. In this regard, a contingency plan is developed to prepare for and respond to these disasters. Emergency response activities during the past year included floods, refugee population movements, combating the Corona virus pandemic, health emergencies, restoring family links, distributing food, and responding to the needs of migrants in a way that preserves their dignity and reduces risks.

Humanitarian situation in Sudan during the reporting period

The conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces that erupted in Sudan on April 15 has killed and injured thousands of people and displaced millions more both within Sudan and in neighboring countries. Some 5.1 million people have been displaced inside and outside the country by the conflict that erupted in mid-April, with more than 4.1 million displaced as of September 5, according to IOM Displacement Tracking Matrix. This is more than double the pre-conflict number of 3.8 million people displaced across the country. People have been displaced from eight states and are sheltering in 3,733 locations across all 18 states, most of which are in River Nile, South Darfur, East Darfur, Northern, Sennar and North Darfur states. Some 69 per cent of the displaced are originally from Khartoum state. In addition, 1,004,261 people have crossed Sudan's borders into neighbouring countries, including the Central African Republic, Chad, Egypt, Ethiopia and South Sudan, according to the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR)..

Nearly half of all people experiencing acute food insecurity across Sudan are in Khartoum, Central Darfur, South Darfur, West Darfur, and South Kordofan – Gezira states, the states most affected by the conflict between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces. Some 9.6 million people in these states are in IPC Phases 3 and 4 (crisis and emergency levels, respectively). This includes 2.9 million people in emergency levels of acute food insecurity (IPC Phase 4), which is one step away from famine (IPC Phase 5). Overall, 20.3 million people across Sudan are acutely food insecure and in need of food and livelihood assistance between July and September 2023, according to the latest update of the Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) in Sudan..

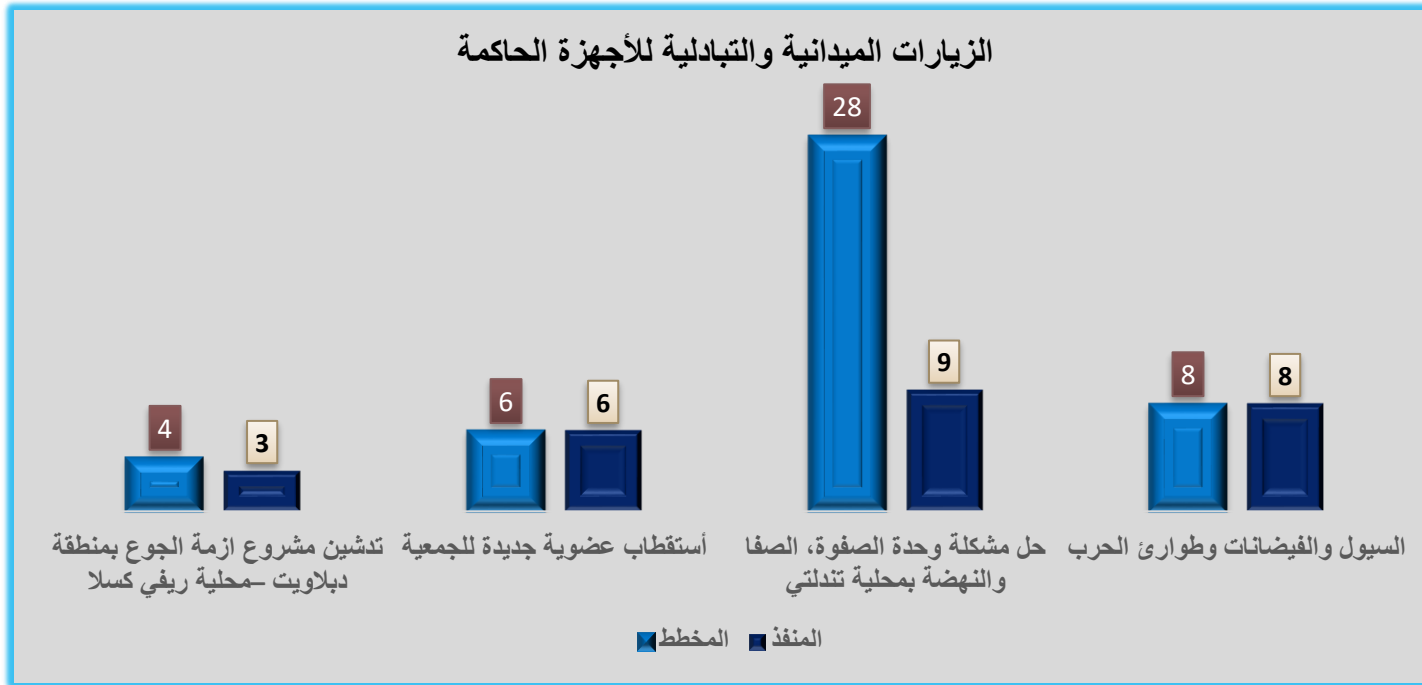
1. the Meetings:

- One training workshop for employees on financial procedures for the purpose of adhering to the completion of financial procedures according to accounting regulations

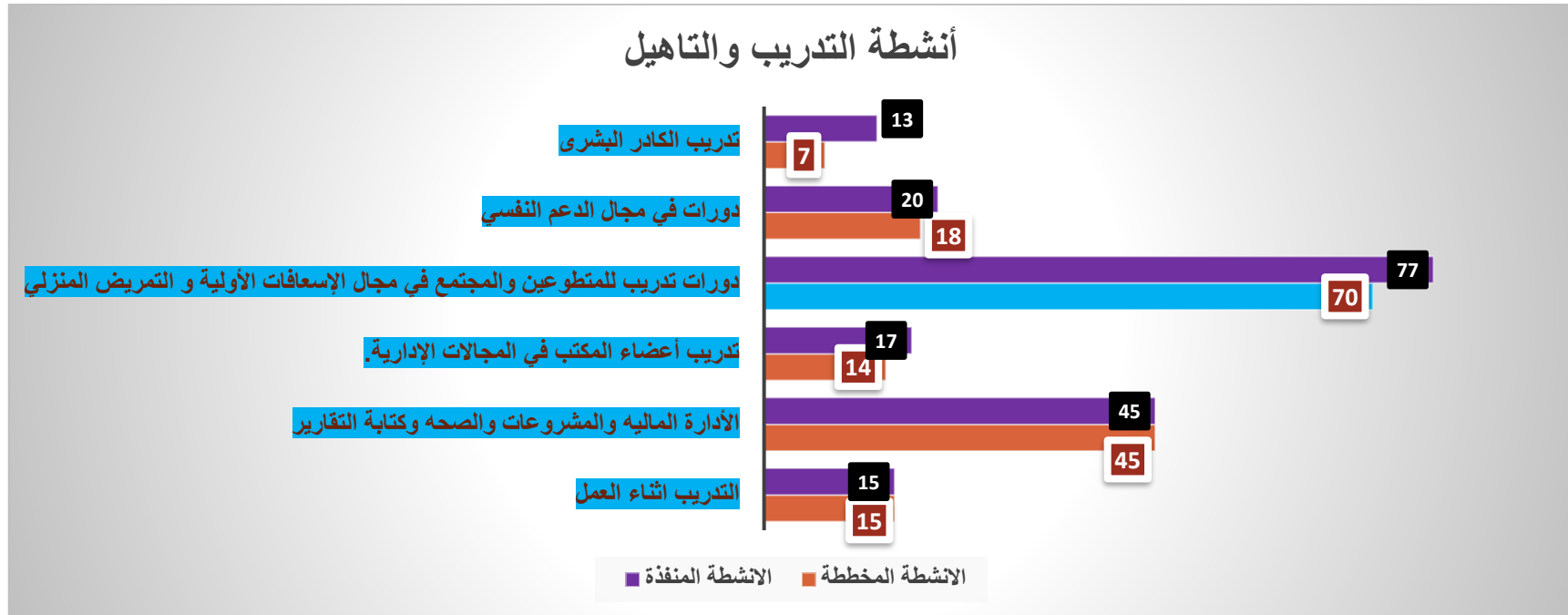

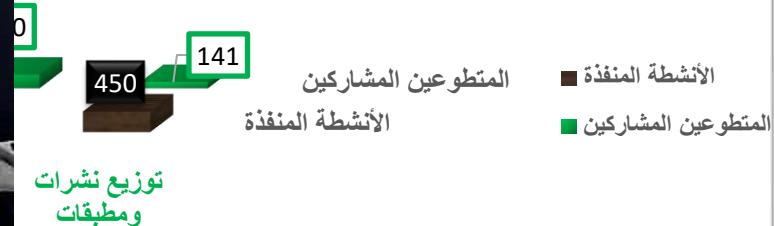
The points below illustrate the activities of the Volunteer Development Department that were implemented during the reporting period:

- In March 2023, with funding from the Swedish Red Cross, three training courses were implemented on

volunteer concepts, volunteer safety and security standards for volunteer leaders and volunteer management coordinators.

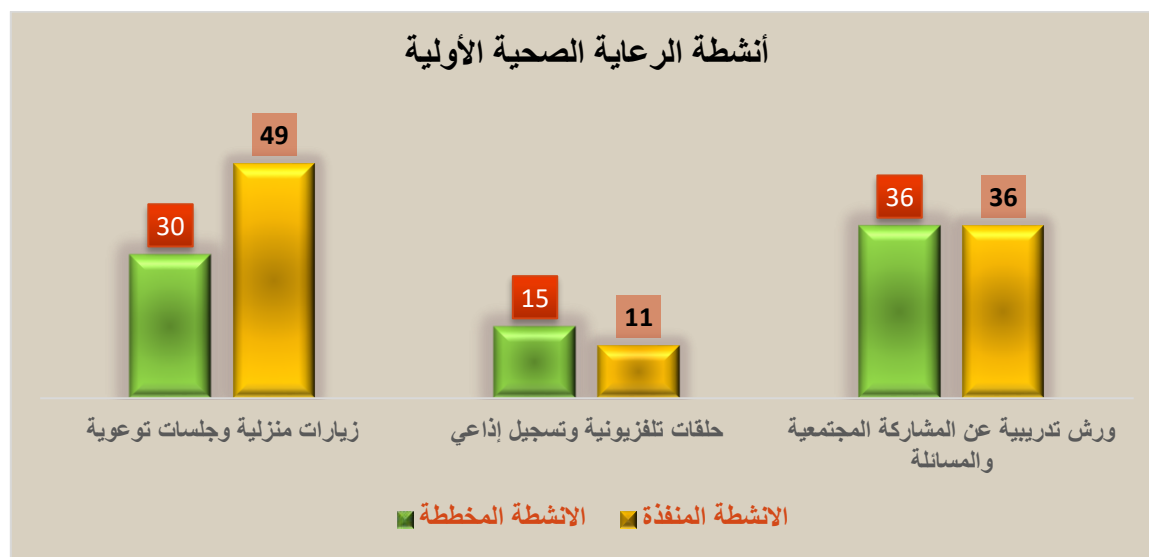

The chart below shows the primary health care activities implemented during the reporting period:



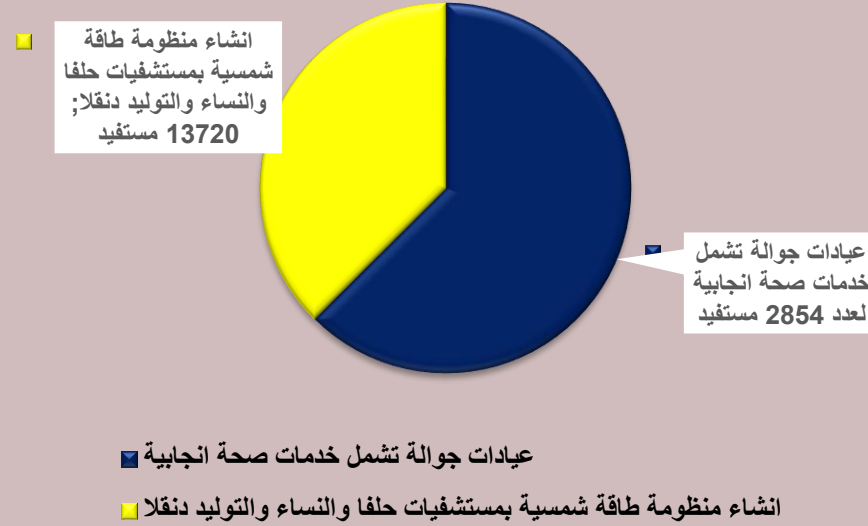

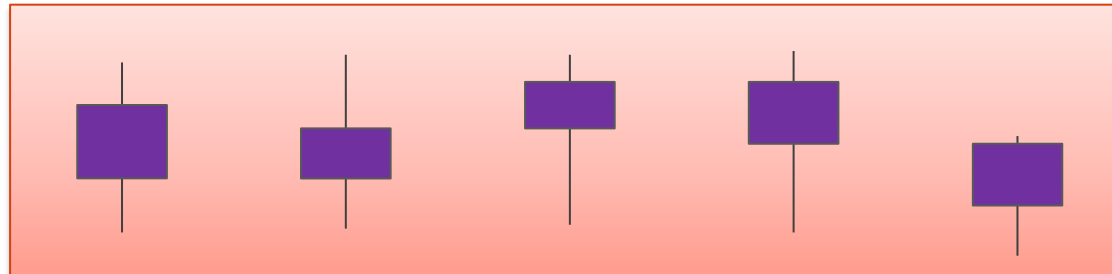

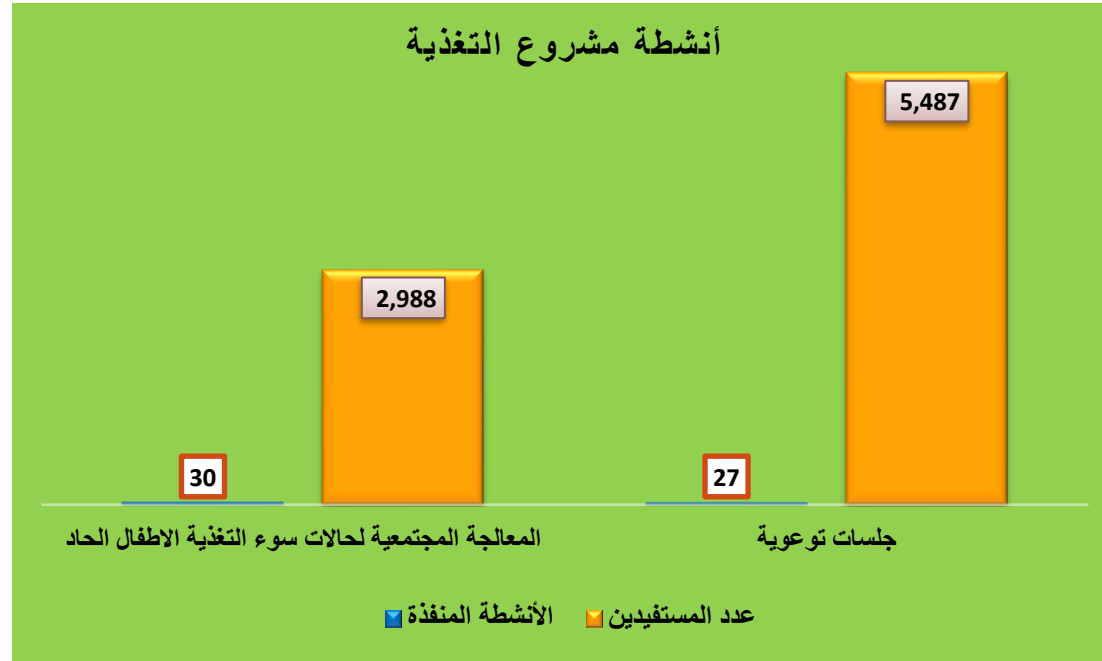

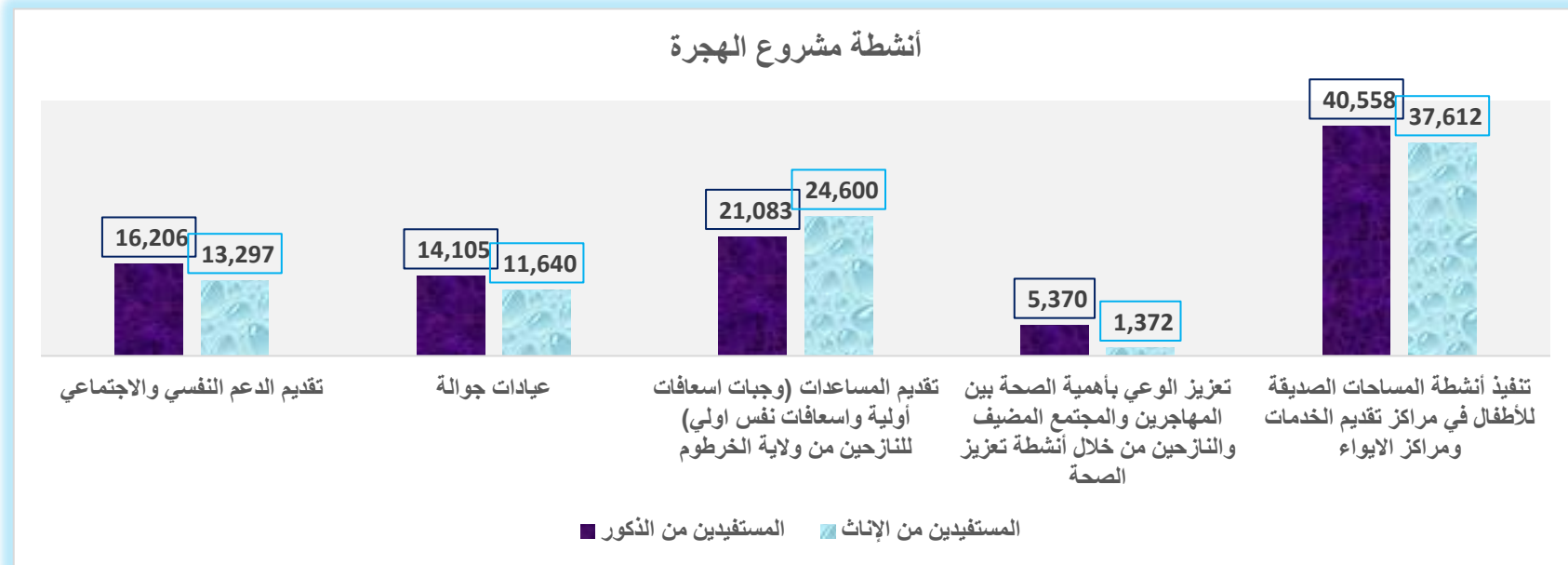

- Families' opinions were taken using community participation applications and a satisfaction questionnaire and their level of satisfaction with the provision of services (70 questionnaires).
- A preliminary market survey or assessment was conducted and groups were formed.

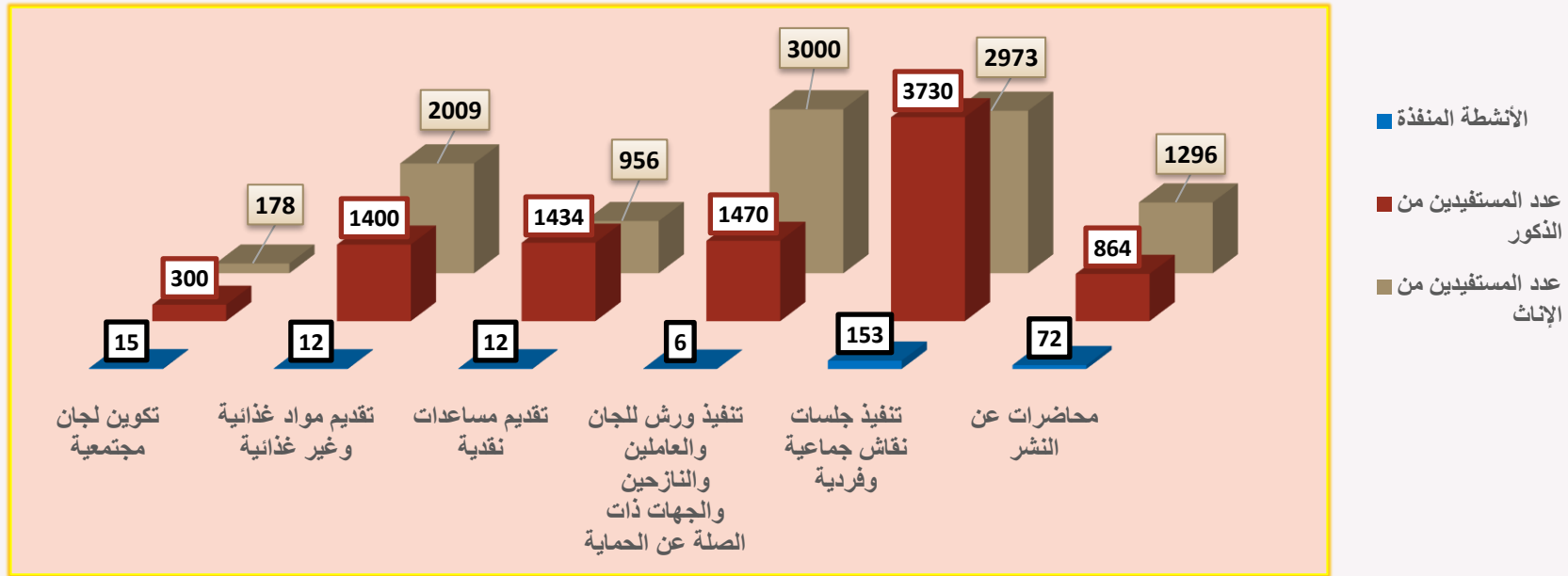

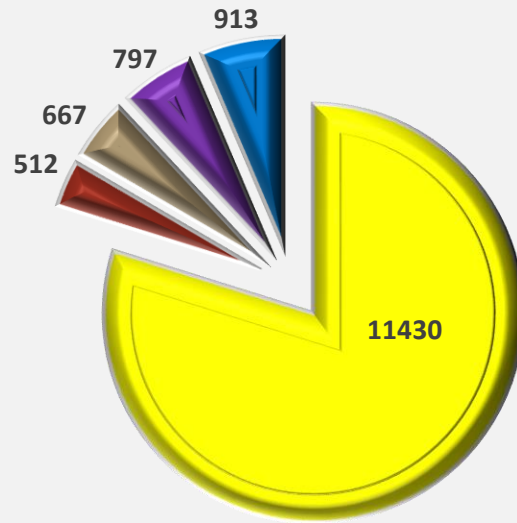

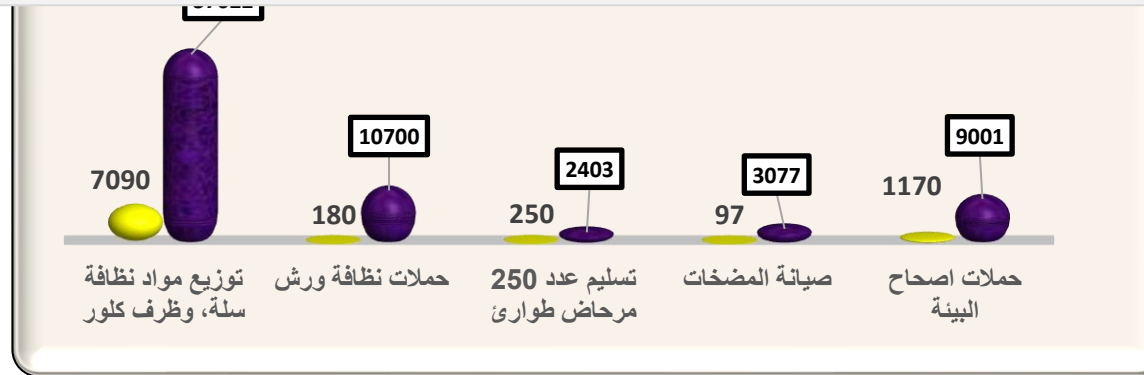

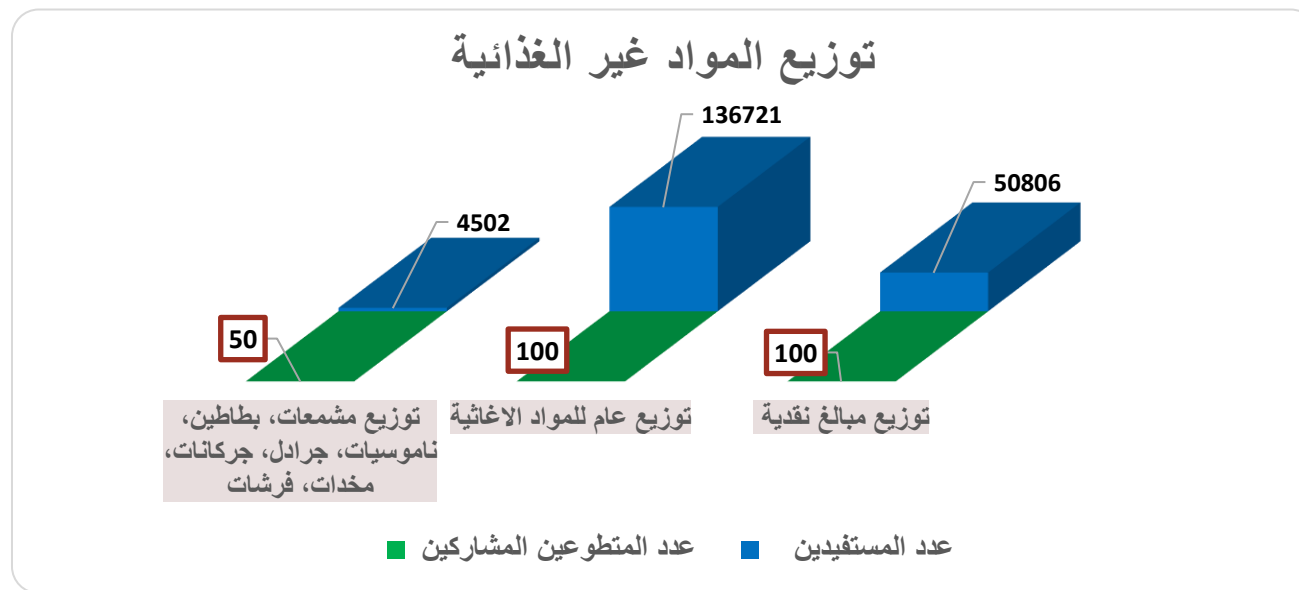

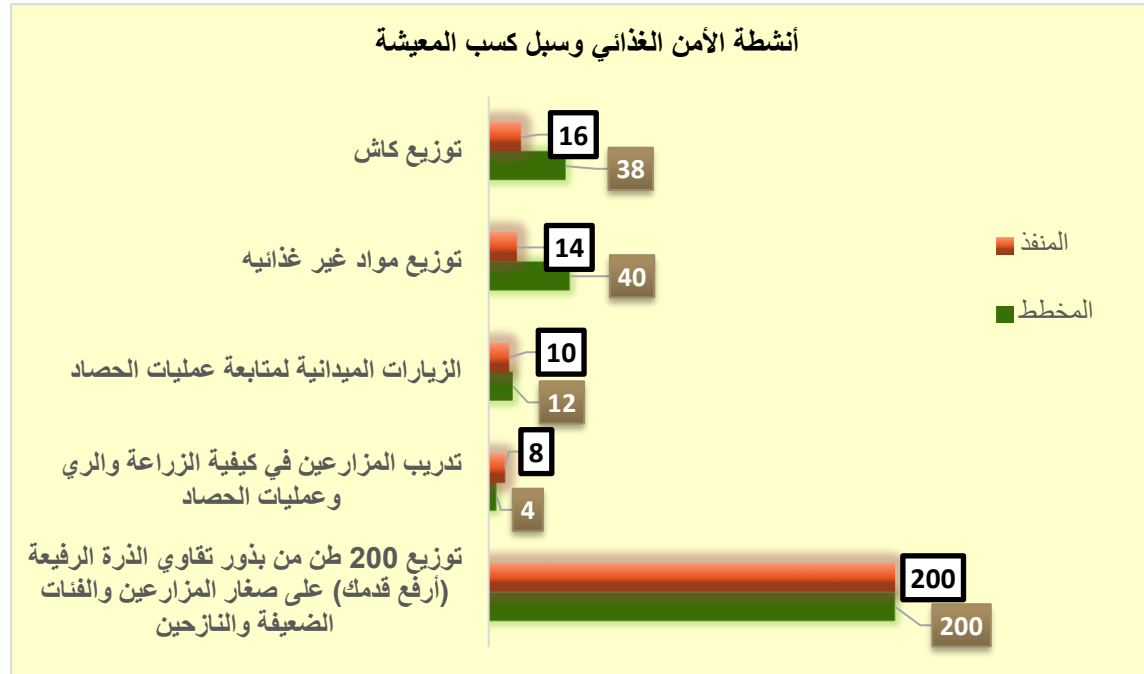

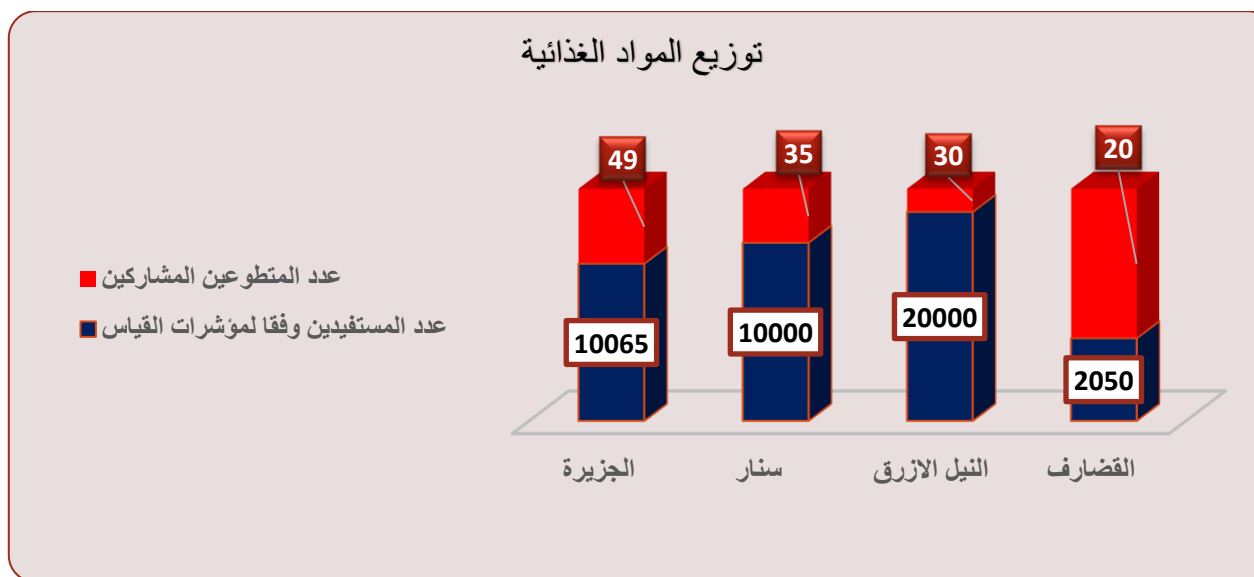

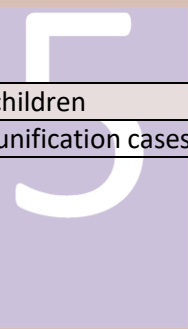

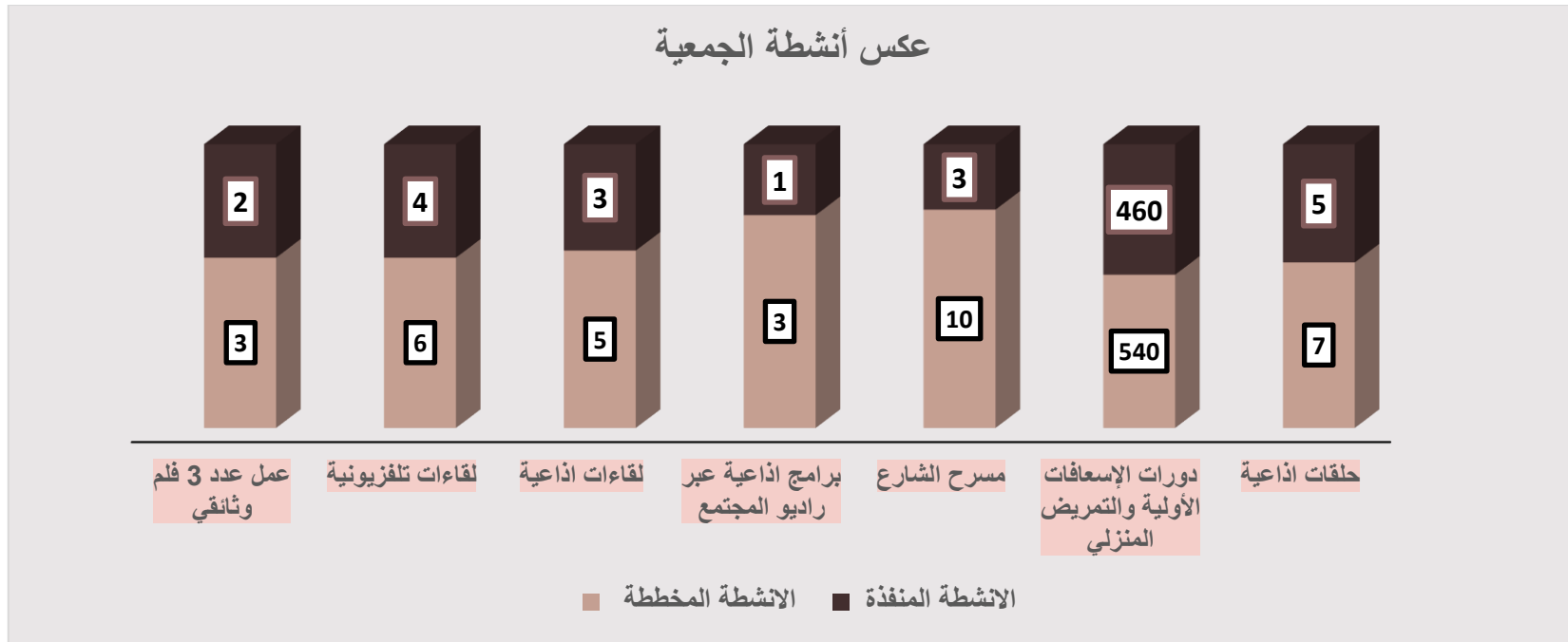

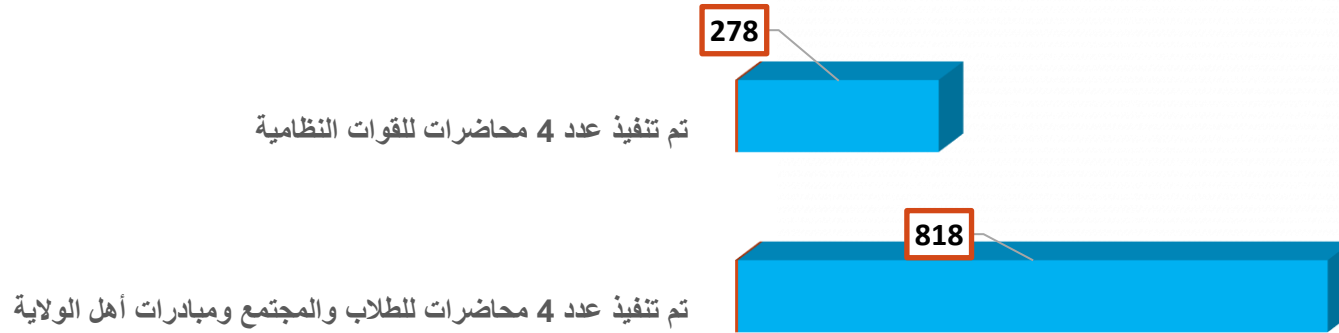


The chart below clearly reflects and documents the association's activities that were implemented during the reporting period:

Report on the Association's intervention in the Sudan emergency events for the period April 15 – December 31, 2024:

background:

Clashes erupted between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces Saturday 15th April 2023, with Darfur and Khartoum states primarily affected,

In addition, on Friday 12/15/2023, the Rapid Support Forces invaded Al-Jazeera State, which led to the displacement of large numbers of citizens in addition to the expatriates in the camps.

Various in the state. As a result of this invasion, the necessities of life in the state were lost, as health services in hospitals stopped and pharmacies and markets were closed in general.

The association faced many challenges, which can be summarized as follows:

1. The association's headquarters at the intersection of King Nimr Street and Al-Jumhuriya Street, the association's warehouse in Bahri, and the Khartoum State branch office were looted, forcing the workers to flee. Either outside the state, to safer areas, or even outside Sudan.
2. Because the work environment is no longer suitable and safe, the association's headquarters has been moved to the Red Sea State to host the branch until further notice.
3. Emergency rooms in affected states have been temporarily moved to other, safer locations.
4. The lack of vehicles and fuel had a major negative impact on the implementation and follow-up of activities.
5. Lack of cash liquidity due to the significant impact on banking systems.
6. Severe shortage of materials IPalmetto and AEmergency medicine Delay in the arrival of work supplies.

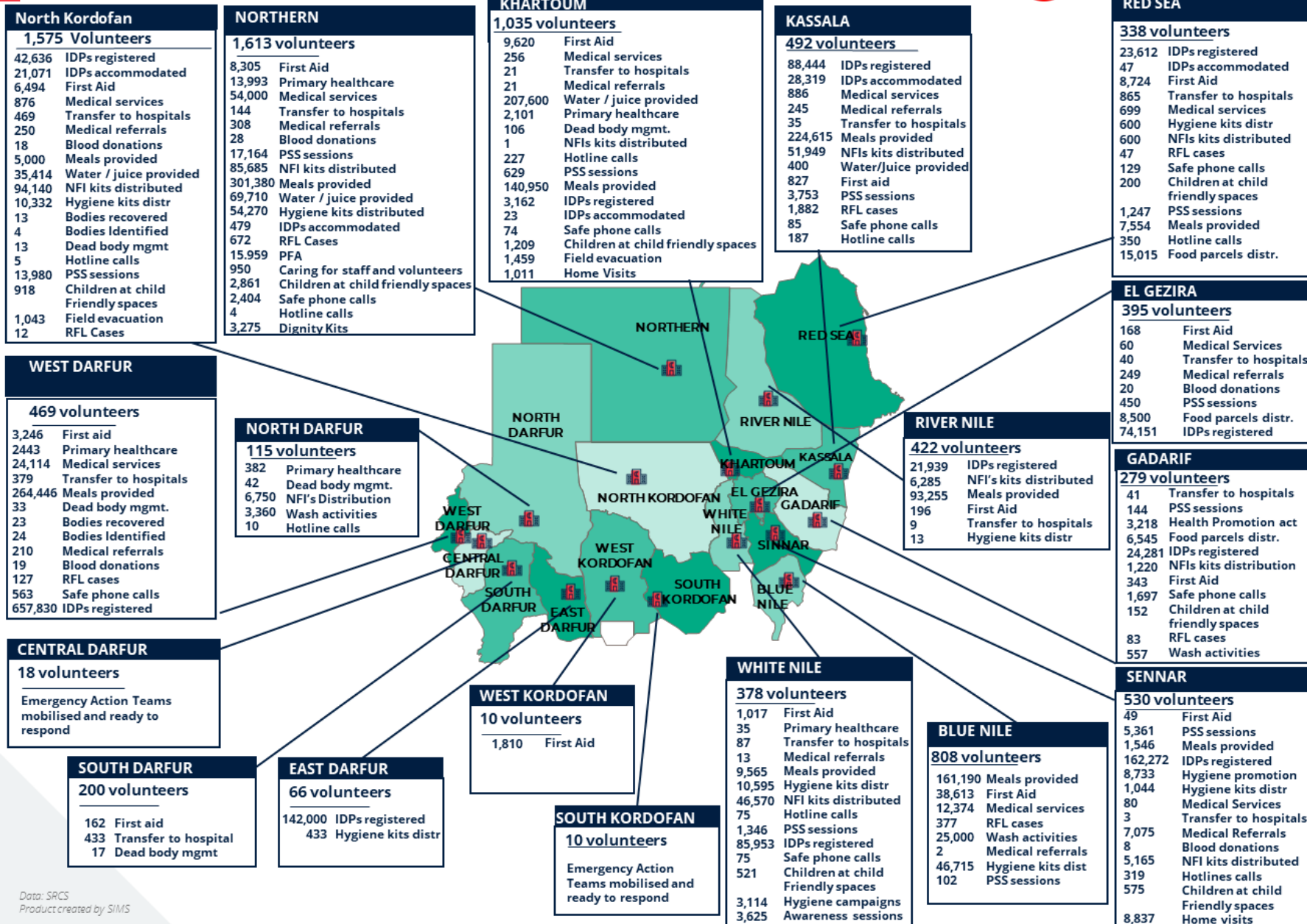

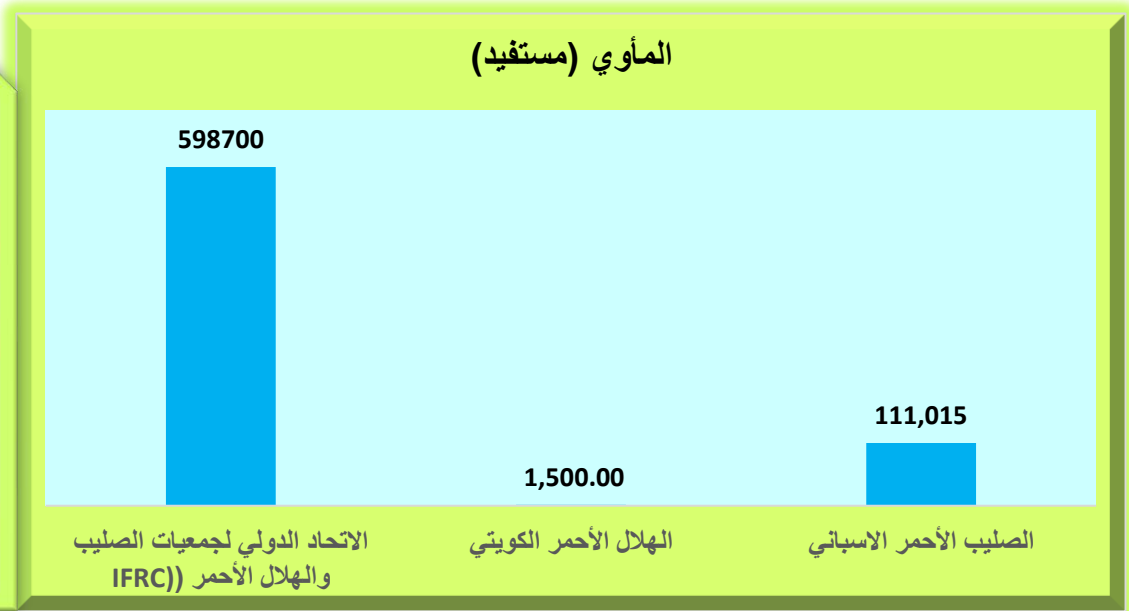
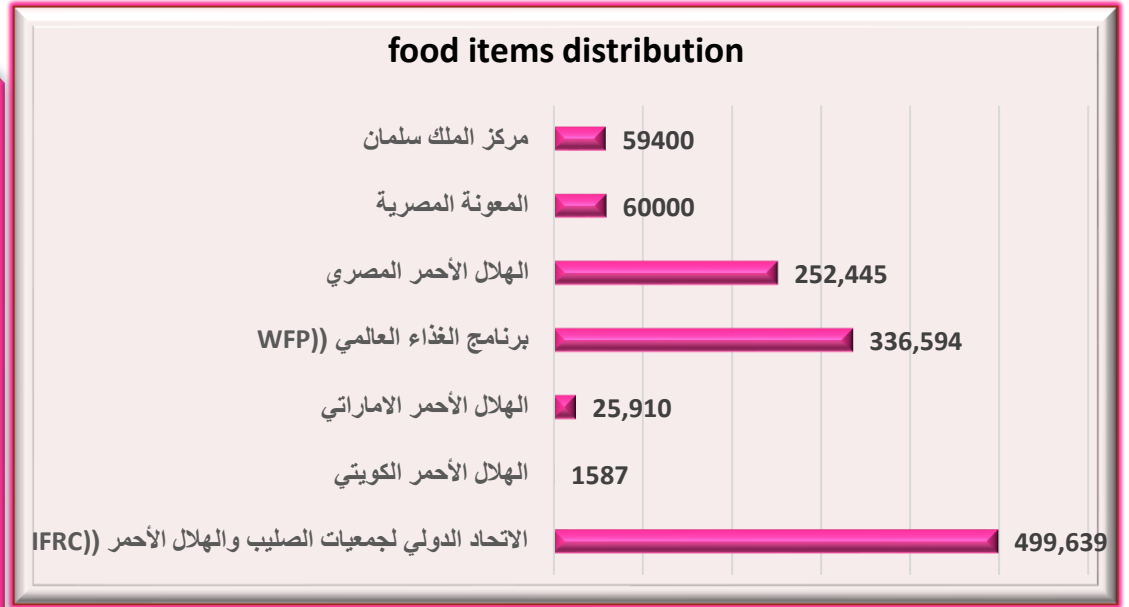
